\$3000 Sewer Extension

Termed 'Unnecessary Work' Dissolve Parking Authority

A feeling that the Parking Authority should be dissolved seems to be shared by most members of council. At Council meeting Monday night, Cr. Don Powers while discussing the Authority's \$4,000 deficit stated: "The Parking Authority was set up to acquire land for parking, if they are not doing anything to acquire land, it should be dissolved. It only causes unnecessary bookkeeping."

The Mayor agreed and asked how the financial agreement whereby the town collects \$2500 from the Authority was negotiated.

Reeve Elliott explained that only the surplus after costs of meter repairing, collecting and sorting, is retained by the Authority. He added that the \$4,000 deficit could probably be paid out of revenue from the meters. In conclusion the Reeve pointed out that any surplus is supposed to be used to improve downtown parking.

Only Cr. Young in addition to the Mayor and Cr. Powers were vocal on the dissolution of the Authority. "We do nothing anyway," the Parking Authority is doing nothing," Cr. Young claimed.

However, no dissenting voice was raised when Cr. Young stated he would bring in a motion next week to dissolve the Authority, and have the town take over their function.

Mayor Joe Gibbons opined - "I think they will be sure to get out of it. I am sure no feelings will be hurt."
