Mullin stated flatly, "I am not supporting Templeton, and do not believe there is any support for him in the county." Mason said he is personally supporting Robert Nixon. Mason would not reveal which candidate he is supporting, but stated clearly that "it is not Templeton."

"It's Like Being Turned Loose in Toyland A Week Before Christmas"

Several are absent. They are either late, or they are researching their individual projects. Anant Panin is designing the handcraft shop and showroom, two floors below us. It is a dusty and rather dismal room, filled with the most marvellous array of carved, gilded and lacquered objects you could imagine. There are papier mache head masks, used in graceful Thai classical dances. Beautifully detailed models of the royal chariots, now used only on ceremonial occasions. Carved teak elephants, famous yellow ornaments, lacquered jewel boxes, and the jewelry like baskets of bamboo, grasses and wicker. Bronze rutilary, silver bowls, models of country houses on stilts, of the boats that ply Thailand's rivers and canals, models of fish and prawns, of musicians playing instruments strange to western eyes. All these things are

in our building, and our job is to present them more effectively to Thai and tourists and the buyers from Eaton's and Simpson's and many others around the world. Ed Van Hoekelen Best Judge in Soil Contest

51 4H club members competed in the Halton County Land Judging Competition on Wednesday, July 8th. The competition so unique in that half the time is spent in instruction and half the time in actual judging. Ed Van Hoekelen, R.R. 2, Acton, was the top scorer in the competition, and won the Land Judging Trophy. Winner in the Junior section was Carol Swackhamer, R.R. 2, Acton; and Lois Hunter, Burlington R.R. 4, 111; Margaret Brownridge, Georgetown, R.R. 2, 100. The competitors met at the Agricultural Hall, Milton Fair Grounds. Here they received instruction on soil profiles and land development in this area, by Jack Galin, Soils and Crop Fieldman for this area. Also in the morning the 4H Club Members toured the Milton area and examined seven profiles of different soil types. During the tour they received instructions on judging land, in practice for the afternoon competition. After a lunch at Rattlesnake Point, they moved to the farm of Lloyd Chisholm in Nassagaweya Township. Four pits were judged here, and placed as to their suitability for growing 4 different crops. When the judging was completed they returned to the Milton Fair Grounds, and gave oral reasons for their decisions. Top scores in the Senior division, for those 17-26 years of age, were Ed Van Hoekelen, Acton R.R. 2, 121; Harold Thompson, Milton R.R. 2, 119; Bill Alexander, Norval R.R. 1, 118. Enrolls For Special Training Course In Massachusetts Deaf School

The Summer Institute, which began on June 29 will run through August 7, is financed by a grant from Lilly Endowment, Incorporated of Indianapolis. This year's Institute provides courses in teaching language, speech and elementary school subjects to the deaf and a course in auditory and speech mechanisms, hearing aids and auditory training. A Seminar in Problems in the Education and Guidance of the Deaf is also scheduled with the Dr. George T. Pratt, Principal of Clarke School, as instructor. The courses are designed to make it possible for those teachers without formal training in the field of deafness but who are presently employed as teachers of the deaf, to gain the basic skills and understanding necessary for them to carry out their responsibilities. There were 106 teachers enrolled in last year's program and 93 enrolled this year, representing 22 states and 5 countries. Mrs. Calvin Coolidge was a graduate of Clarke School Teacher Education Department and taught at the school prior to her marriage.

Employment Found for 484 People Last Month

June was a very good month for job seekers in this area. The National Employment Office reports that 484 persons were placed in employment last month. This is a substantial increase of 156 more than the 328 placed in June 1963. Principal activity was in the manufacturing industries, where jobs were found for 184 individuals. There were 77 persons who obtained employment in the construction industry. Fifty-three persons were engaged by various employers in the wholesale and retail trades, and 50 jobs were filled on local farms. There were 1264 persons registered for employment at the end of June. This is an increase of 440 over the May 1964 figures, and 101 more than were registered as of 30 June 1963. This figure includes about 300 students registered for summer employment. The office serves Chingunacousy, Caledon all of Dufferin County and part of Essex and Township including Georgetown.

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
