

Halton Riding Liberals Pick Their Man in August

Halton Liberals will be meeting between August 17 and 21 to choose delegates for the provincial convention and to decide which candidate will be supported for party leadership.

Liberal Association president, Derek L. Mason said this week that the party meeting was set back from the end of July to the end of August to accommodate large numbers of members who are away on holidays.

The approximate meeting date was set after a week-end executive meeting.

Mason said that there are about 1,200 registered party members in the county.

In reference to reports that Halton liberals would not be supporting Charles Templeton's bid for party leadership, Mason said, "I talked to a number of members but they were non-committal. I don't really think that is not Templeton."

anyone has made a solid decision yet. It isn't even clear yet who the contenders for party leadership will be.

"In my own personal opinion, it is conceivable that Templeton could get the support of Halton Liberals, but I don't really think he will."

Last week, Mason and former provincial candidate and party leader Owen Mullin made it known that their support was not behind Templeton's leadership bid.

Mullin stated flatly, "I am not supporting Templeton and I don't believe there is any support for him in the county."

Mullin said that he personally supported Robert Nixon.

Mason would not reveal which candidate he is supporting but stated clearly that, "I don't really think that is not Templeton."

Oxford Farms are Surveyed During Halton Farmers Tour

Sixty-three members of the Halton Soil & Crop Improvement Association visited Oxford County on their annual Bus Tour, on Tuesday, July 14.

The morning was spent at Don Hart's farm, Woodstock. The Hartholm Farm has a milk herd of ninety Holsteins, and about three hundred heifers and steers in a beef feedlot. Particular interest was shown in the use of haylage, high moisture corn, and corn silage, in his feeding program.

A field of Dufur's alfalfa directly seeded this spring yielded over six tons per acre at the end of June.

Following lunch at South side Park in Woodstock, the Halton members travelled to the farm of Fred Richens, president of the Oxford Soil and Crop Association. Mr. Richens handles sixty cows in a loose housing and milking parlour arrangement. He also makes use of haylage and corn silage. Some corn on this farm was eight feet high.

At Ed Lovell's at Veschovie, his free-stall setup for Jersey cows was of much interest. The cows are loose at all times but each has a stall to lie down in. The passage ways are cleaned daily by tractor. This method greatly reduces straw re-

quirements, and cuts down labour.

At the farm of Al Lossing, Norwich, the members viewed a 225 acre field of corn. Mr. Lossing grows over eight hundred acres of grain corn each year. He uses minimum tillage, similar to the other farms visited in Oxford. The land is plowed in the spring, and immediately planted, without any disking or cultivating. Atrazine is used for weed control. Mr. Lossing prepared the land and planted this eight hundred acres in nineteen days, with two men plowing, and one planting immediately afterwards.

All four farmers used early maturing corn hybrids - from eight to ninety days maturity. By using plant population of up to 24,000 plants per acre, high fertility, and Atrazine for weed control, they feel that the earlier maturing varieties are usually more productive, with less risk of a crop failure.

The use of silage for both corn and hay has increased rapidly in practically all farms in Oxford County. This permits greater automation, more efficient use of the crop, and permits greater numbers of livestock to be carried on the farm.

Harold Thompson Tops At Forestry Achievement Day

The Halton 4-H Forestry Club held its Achievement Day in conjunction with the County Land Judging Competition on Wednesday, July 15. Seven members completed their projects. This 4-H Club is sponsored by the Halton Region Conservation Authority, with Dave Murray, Conservation Authority Fieldman, as Club Leader. The Club is under the direction of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, and Jack Starr, of Hespeler, Ont.

The 4-H Club organized in January of this year, held its regular monthly meetings and its annual Field Tour in late June. At these meetings members studied woodland management, tree insects and diseases, tree and leaf identifications, and other topics related to forestry.

Harold Thompson, Milton, R.R. 2, stood at the top of the Club, with 688 points out of a possible 1000 points. Other scores were:

Bob Peattie, Milton, R.R. 5, 680; Elizabeth Norrington, Milton, R.R. 6, 683; Verna Thompson, Milton, R.R. 2, 681; Lois Hunter, Burlington, R.R. 1, 650.

For their projects, members had a choice of planting a

woodlot, reforestation or improved woodlot. These projects were marked by the Zone Forester. The best project was done by Harold Thompson. All members had to prepare an exhibit of twenty leaves; white Juniors selected twenty twigs; and Seniors, two diseases and ten woods. Receiving top marks for their exhibits were Verna and Harold Thompson. These exhibits will be on display at the Milton Fair.

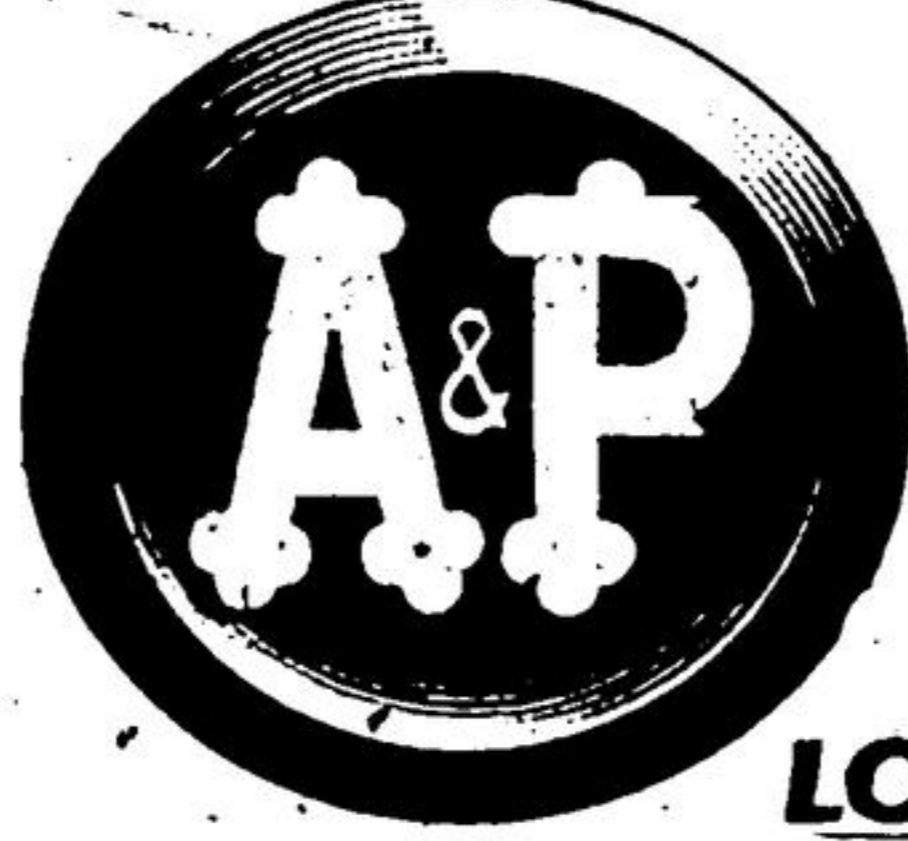
