

Ron Lytle is New Chairman For Local Industrial Commission

Georgetown's much shuffled industrial commission has a new chairman, Ronald Lytle. He was named to the office at the inaugural meeting of the town's new industrial sales team in the Council Chamber Thursday night.

He succeeds Deputy Reeve W. Hunter in the post. Deputy Reeve Hunter, who resigned some time ago, has been acting chairman until a permanent commission head was elected.

Reeve John Elliott was authorized to continue as secretary-treasurer.

Eight of the nine members attended the first session. Only one man unable to make it was a non-councillor Connell Smith who was out of town on business.

When completed, a revised industrial survey of Georgetown will be sent to the Department of Economics and Development. A commission member said the survey is still in process but when it is concluded the Department will receive a copy plus an invitation to attend a future Georgetown Industrial Commission meeting.

Also on the business dock, a motion to assemble more industrial brochures into booklet form and bring any out of date information in the brochures up to date. The industrial brochure is kept in the dismantled stage as changes in the industrial picture here will not make the entire book obsolete. The system allows the commission to change on the pages where necessary thereby saving expense.

Another project under the commission's wing is listing the

local factory buildings presently vacant so this information could be included in dealings with prospective industries. New methods of obtaining new industries and finding out about their intentions to expand and move were topics of one discussion. The old reliable personal contact method and door-to-door inquiry, though the most time consuming were upheld as still the most productive.

One suggestion that found agreement was better public relations and publicity for the local group so that everyone in Georgetown is made aware of the commission's attempts to attract industry. One commissioner expressed hope that everyone in Georgetown would act in his own way to help the industrial picture by boosting the community when vacationing and passing along any tips of industry looking to relocate when they hear of them.

The commission is also interested in encouraging local firms to expand and one such instance was noted. Georgetown Tool and Die, one of the more recent companies to locate in the industrial area on the north side of No. 7 Highway has applied for a permit to build a new 4,000 sq. feet building.

Advertising the town's industrial facilities and land via postage meter advertising stamped on outgoing mail was an idea that the commission is giving serious consideration to.

HIGH SCHOOL BOARD BRIEFS

Two people associated with education here have found the profession so attractive they've gone a step farther and become teachers. A member of the High School Board's Advisory Vocational Commission tendered his resignation at a board meeting last week because he is leaving town to teach in Picton.

At the same meeting the board secretary, Mrs. Helga Hansen, tendered her resignation and shorted at Fenelon Falls.

The board expressed their regret at losing both an AVC member and an employee.

Parents of nine students in the Silvercreek-Balfour area which was recently rezoned in to the Action district petitioned the board for transportation for these students who will continue to attend Georgetown high. Because they are upper school students they have the option of continuing their secondary school education here, but it was left to them to find their own transportation when the rezoning was made.

The request that the Georgetown board handle their transportation was turned over to the transportation committee.

The pass rate among Georgetown high school's grade 12 students was 88.7% it was reported at the meeting by principal J. L. Lambert. "Much better than last year," Mr. Lambert noted. He's working the pass percentage of all the grade and it happened the Gr. 12 was completed at the time of the meeting.

The Advisory Vocational Commission will be dealing with two major items when they meet this week. Number one, drafting a night school board, and number two, suggesting a replacement on the AVC for John Mathies who represented electronics.

An Exquisit representative on the board, Donald Lawson, urged his fellow trustees to give serious consideration to encouraging Physics teacher to take a new course of study now available in the U.S. by paying their tuition fees of \$25 each. He said they are now 17 centres in the States offering the course and advised the board's assistance to interested teachers would pay off.
