### Mayor-Powers Tangle on Cause of Water Deficit

Two readings of a by-law to borrow \$37,000 to cover a deficit in Georgetown's water department passed council on Monday on a split 5-4 vote.

The deficit has caused some stormy council sessions, and again on Monday the mayor and water chairman Don Powers tangled on the question.

Mayor Gibbons insists that the deficit came about because of concessions made to some local industries, reducing the 50% sewer service charge on water accounts. The reductions were made on the basis of how much water actually enters the sewers from the industries.

"I feel residential users have been discriminated against," insisted Mayor Gibbons.

Cr. Emmerson disagreed. "The sewer service rate goes into the town treasury and is separate from the water department," he said, "where you connect this with a water deficit is beyond me."

"We've carried on this fight for six months and your knowledge of this is practically nil," Cr. Powers told the mayor.

### Town Manager for Georgetown? Council Majority Says "No"

Though some councillors expressed agreement with the principle of a municipality having a town manager, they do not believe Georgetown specifically is in a position to hire one.

A Hildebrandt-Elliott motion to adopt this as a local policy was snuffed under Monday in a 7-2 council vote.

Mayor Gibbons gave the idea short shrift.

"If I ever heard a motion condemning your own operations, this is it," he told the councillors. "Anyone who votes for this admits he isn't capable of transacting the public business," said the mayor.

Cr. Emmerson observed that the discussion was "a lot of hanky-panky."

"Maybe we should revert to the old system where water costs weren't kept separate, and any deficit was hidden in the tax rate," he said.

Cr. Francis Young and Smith joined the deputy reeve in opposing the borrowing by-law, which now goes to the Municipal Board for endorsement.
