Reconstruction of the eastern part of No. 7 highway has hit another snag.

Monday council was told that acquisition of land needed to widen and straighten the Mountainview Rd. interchange will be disputed by Delrex Developments, owner of one corner.

Some councillors favoured backtracking the Mountainview corner to a later stage of construction. But when it came to a vote council favoured going ahead with the project as designed.

"It has to be done sooner or later," said Deputy Reeve, Hunter Reeve Elliott, Crs. V. Smith and Young agreed with him.

The Delrex firm was blasted by Cr. Young as throwing a stumbling block into council's path.

"They aren't interested in remedying the Mountainview corner, and this isn't conducive to a harmonious future," said Cr. Young.
