Firemen poured water on a attached tool shed and an empty cottage when it was obvi- ous the barn wasn't going to be saved. Neighbours Mrs. John Emmerson and Mrs. Tom Parry both noticed smoke sweep- ing from around the barn door at the same time both called the fire department.
Chief Erwin Lewis said the heat was so intense at the height of the blaze that shing- les on the empty cottage, al- so owned by Mr. Erwin, start- ed to melt.
The fire call was the second this week. Saturday night the engine of a car caught fire on Guelph St. near the high school and burned the wiring system off.
