Ask Ratepayers Approve \$500 Pipe Band Grant
At Georgetown's December elections, voters will be asked their opinion on a \$500 yearly grant to the Girl's Pipe Band.

The band has received a \$350 yearly fee for some time which Mayor Gibbons recently claimed is illegal without a vote of the people. Several years ago, voters endorsed a \$1500 yearly grant to the citizens band.

While all councillor seemed to favour the grant, three voted against the plebiscite for varying reasons. Reeve Elliott said changing conditions could vary the money needed, Cr. Young wanted them to have more and Cr. Hildebrandt termed the plebiscite unnecessary. The Municipal Act, while denying a grant without a vote in one section, allows the town to engage a band for entertainment of distinguished visitors, he said, and council could continue on this basis.

Lane Asks Town to Take Subdivision Roads
Through his solicitor, Bob Lane asked council Monday to take over roads in his subdivision.
He said he is proceeding with sodding, sidewalk repairs and street signs and said he would foot the bill if the town completes sewer work.
Council's road committee will study the proposal.

basis of the amount of water which actually enters the sewerage system. Four town industries have been paying less than the 50% after providing satisfactory proof to previous council.
Moody the mayor found support from Ted Francis who introduced himself as an elected official of Georgetown Ratepayers Association.
Mr. Francis demanded dropping the reduced rates to industry, while also strongly objecting to any water rate increase to householders.
"We have signatures to prove how strong people are against the increase," he said.
Another ratepayer, Robert Letts asked what caused the deficit and charged Crs. Powers and Emmerman (Both Smith & Stone employees) with "conflict of interest".
Mayor Gibbons said he intends to recommend that water, now a separate department be handled in the town's general tax rate.
"Exactly what I recommended last year," said Cr. Powers "is just an accounting procedure and would have no effect on water costs."
"We could give you free water, but you'll pay for it in your taxes," said Cr. Emmerman. "If you don't want a rate increase we could do like other towns and reduce the maximum gallonage on the \$3.00 charge."
Cr. Hildebrandt maintained council is following its by-law and that the sewer service rate goes into general taxes and has nothing to do with the water department at all.
"I say to Mr. Letts that we could run Smith & Stone right out of town if we made an exorbitant sewer charge," he said.
Cr. Powers offered to meet with the association and go over the question and said one charge of \$11,000 assessed to water in 1962 should actually have been to general revenue.
He hotly denied Mr. Letts' charge.
He said he might table a motion to do away with the present system and take the whole amount from general taxes. Some 2.3 mills would be needed, he said, and it would mean that 75% of the residential taxpayers would end up paying more than they do on the present system.
"We have borrowed \$38,000 and we have to pay it back," observed Deputy Reeve Hunter. "We either have to raise

water rates or the mill rate." Reeve Elliott noted that if the money is paid from the general tax rate requesting water users would not be assessed any extra, as they would if water rates were raised. (A number of township residents use town resources and are charged a double rate.)
"I don't agree we have to raise the mill rate," said the mayor. "In fact I can see no reason why next year's tax rate can't be reduced. This is a mistake of previous years and we were ordered by the Dept. of Municipal Affairs to rectify it. If industry had paid their 50% the town treasury would have another \$40,000 and we wouldn't be in this position."

"Back Where We Started" Says Mayor Loan is Vetoed

Earlier this year, Mr. Bolton of the Dept. of Municipal Affairs told the town it must provide \$20,000 to cover a year-end deficit in the Board of Parks account.

It would be a special levy on taxpayers, according to the by-law wording and Reeve Elliott objected to this. The money should rather be taken from the yearly grant to the board, he said. (Others favoured a two-year loan.
With no one volunteering a new plan, the proposed by-law was filed.
