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Await Analysis Crude Oil Discovery, Hornby

Tony Seynuck, who discovered oil on a Hornby farm, a few weeks ago, is presently awaiting the results of an analysis of crude oil he pumped from the site.

The analysis is being conducted by the B.A. refinery in Clarkson. Oil was discovered on the farm of George Hall in early July after 8 weeks of drilling there.

Seynuck stopped pumping operations after taking 2,000 gallons from the well and forced acid and water into the hole for a few hours, then flushed it out in an attempt to open the pores in the rock and increase the seepage.

Since the acid application Mr. Seynuck has been letting the underground reservoir build up. He said he would start pumping the oil again in a couple of weeks and expects it will produce five times the amount it did at first.

The driller has been moved from the Hall farm to the Scott farm three miles south on the Ninth Line, and drilling there started this week. Mr. Seynuck owns oil leases on about thirty Hornby area farms.

Since he first started searching for gas and oil in the county, Mr. Seynuck has sunk 43 wells, 23 of which were productive. Of that number 2 produced oil and the rest natural gas. His first oil well was drilled at Speyside.

Oil from the Speyside well was sold to Cities Service. Mr. Seynuck noted that top grade crude oil brings from \$3.50 to \$4 per 35 gallon barrel.

Health Nurses Short In Halton

Halton County is desperately in need of public health nurses, termed "a scarce commodity" by Dr. L. M. Stuart of the County's Health Unit today.

He said that less than half the nurses needed by the county are now employed by the unit, and the response to the county's advertising so far has been "disappointing."

There should be 25 public health nurses in Halton, he said, but at the present time there are only 11. The Director of Nursing, Miss Grace Leavy, said that until more nurses are available she will be forced to adjust the nursing program.

Following recent newspaper advertising by the county, two applications were received and one accepted. Miss Leavy was given authority to accept the second application if she is satisfied with the applicant after interviewing her.

One application was also received from one certified nursing assistant, and the Board of Health was advised that this applicant would be able to replace the Public Health Nurse of some routine work, when hired.

Dr. Stuart said that he felt the Halton nurses were adequately paid, but the main reason for their scarcity was the specialized training they must possess before they can perform public health work.

They must be registered nurses and have one extra college year, or be bachelors of science, or have a similar degree from a recognized university.

A recent study on a county level of job specification, work schedules and salary scales, when completed and in effect will render some positions more attractive and more clearly define departmental jobs. Dr. Stuart said he felt this would help to relieve the shortage, beside the advertisements recently placed in six newspapers across Canada.

Local Witnesses Attended Convention in Guelph Last Week

The largest religious convention ever held by Jehovah's Witnesses in Guelph concluded its four days of sessions on Sunday with an afternoon attendance of 4,718 to hear Eugene D. Roam, Jr., Supervising Minister of the group in Canada, discuss the subject "Peace Among Men of Good Will, or Armageddon - Which?"

Mr. Roam pointed out that the most up-to-date Bible translations reveal that the expression "Peace on earth among men of good will" really signifies "Men with whom He is pleased" or "Peace for men on whom His favour rests."

In order to be those who get His good will, Mr. Roam added, it is necessary to assist others by providing them with a knowledge of God's Word, teaching them about His kingdom.

Adding to the international flavour of the assembly, were delegates from Finland, Kenya, Northern Rhodesia and Greece, as well as Canada and the United States.

What really is the purpose of such meetings? we asked Mr. Roam. He replied: "Any social worker can tell you that many of the difficulties people have come as a result of personal lack of balance. The items we have been discussing under the Bible expression 'fruits of the spirit' - love, peace, self-control, kindness, faith, long-suffering are really part of a program of adult education. Everyone has a personality flaw in some of these respects; this program is designed to help everyone to be a more rounded-out, better-balanced individual. This, therefore, adds to the effectiveness of the individual approach to the convention. Despite the extreme heat, young and old could be observed diligently taking notes and listening intently to the twenty-one different ministers who spoke during the four-day sessions.

In addition to the sessions, delegates visited most homes in Guelph to extend a personal invitation to the main Sunday lecture. All hotel and motel accommodations in Guelph were occupied and delegates were travelling in kitchens for the only remaining hotels. Many private homes in Guelph also opened rooms to the visitors.

Spiritual food was also supplemented by the natural kind as H. J. Katzmer of Kitcheners awfully guided 135 volunteer workers in the operation of a unique type of temporary cafeteria especially developed to care for the needs of such events. More than eight thousand six hundred meals were served. The shopping list included 2,500 lbs. of beef, 400 lbs of ham, 80 bags of potatoes, 500 lbs. of flour and 100 cases of canned goods.

Mr. Larry Lees, Circuit Minister who took charge of organizing the convention said: "We have really had the finest co-operation from the police, civic officials and the citizens of Guelph. Their hospitality is most commendable and we wish to publicly express our thanks. In return we have encouraged many to take a firmer hold on the great hopes held out in God's Word, the Bible. We look forward to being back in Guelph again as opportunity affords."
