

**Thought Plane Down Here Find Wreck, Pilot Dead**

A sailplane pilot who was thought to have come down in the Georgetown area was found dead in the wreckage of his aircraft last Wednesday near Campbellville.  
Mrs. Francis Popp, of Jersey City, N.J., the wife of the dead pilot, scoured Georgetown and vicinity Monday afternoon searching for her missing husband.  
Another sail plane pilot, John Kuhn, of Madison Heights, Michigan, who was a fellow contestant in the sailplane soaring competition with Popp landed his airplane in a field in Georgetown Monday morning.  
A 17-year-old high school boy, Bob Bunce, accidentally stumbled on the wreckage of the missing glider and the dead pilot Wednesday after search planes had scoured the countryside.  
Moments before Bunce found the wreckage, an RCMP plane had spotted it and was radiating in for rescuers to head for the crash scene.  
The glider went down in a 10-acre pasture on the farm of George Kallins, about two miles outside of Campbellville.  
The pasture is bordered on three sides by dense unclipped bushes and by a field of tall corn on the fourth.  
Bunce said he did not know the glider had been missing. He said he walked into the field about 11:15 a.m. and saw the white wreckage scattered at the far end.  
"I knew right away it was a plane," said Bunce. "I walked over and saw the pilot still strapped into his seat. I tried the man's pulse even though I was sure he was dead." The glider was badly broken up.  
"I noticed that a plane was circling the area so I spelled out the word DEAD with a number of stones and then went back to my uncle's farm house." At the house Bunce called the Milton hospital which in turn called the OPP.  
Department of transport officials investigating the crash said they thought the glider had gone into a spin and plunged straight down into the field. Coroner Dr. Robert Buchner of Acton said the pilot had suffered many broken bones and his head was badly damaged.
