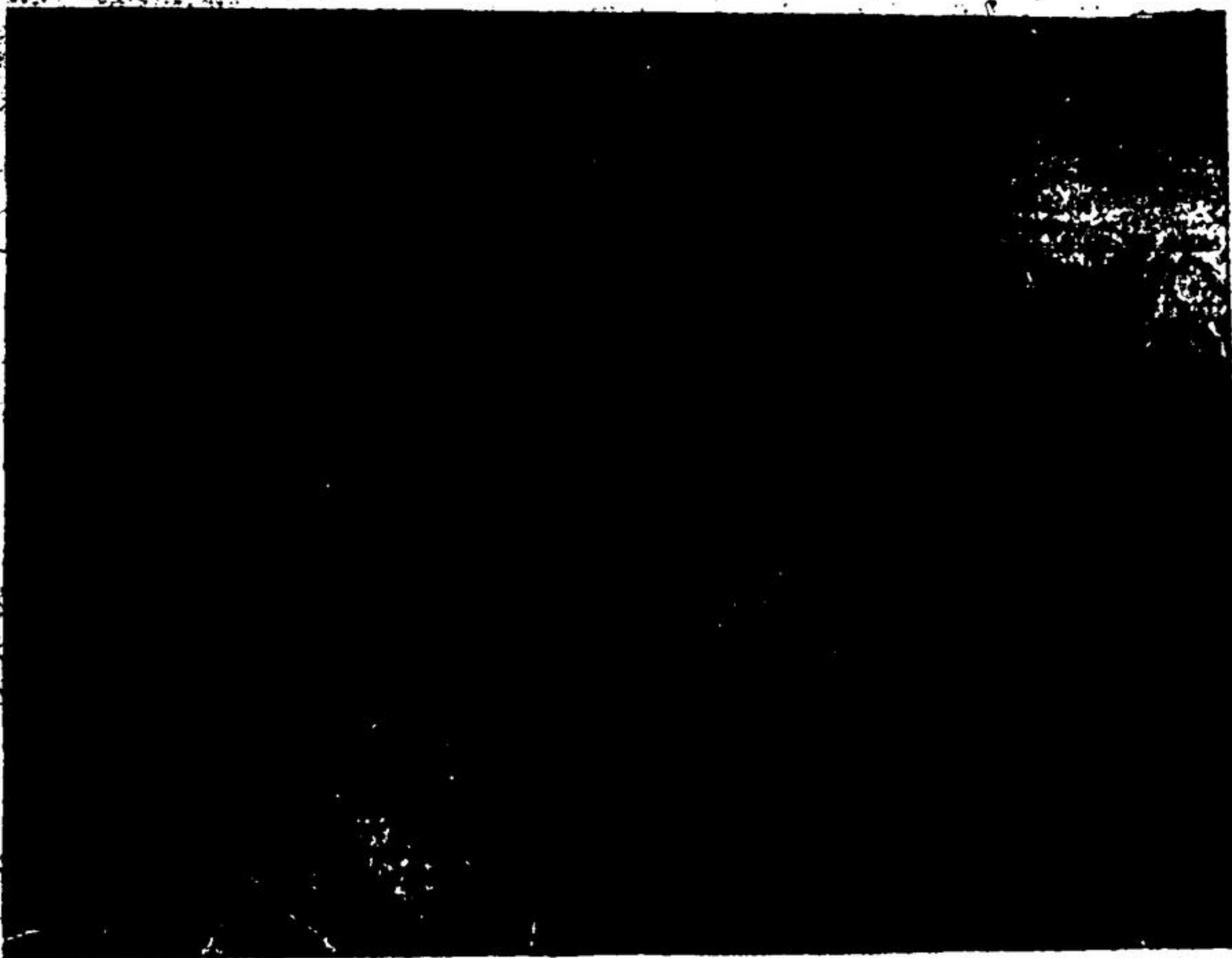

An unattended pan which boiled over in the kitchen of Georgetown hospital touched off the alarm which sent firemen to the scene early Tuesday morning. The automatic fire detection system activated the siren.
