

# Holy Cross Rector Announces Date for Sweeping Changes

Important upcoming changes in the liturgy of the Roman Catholic Church were officially announced in Holy Cross church here Sunday when Father O'Grady announced to the congregation that the changes will start in January 1965.

**CREED IN ENGLISH**  
For the Masses of Holy Week and of this year. But whereas the Kyrie is to become English in the United States, it will remain in Greek in Canada. The Collect and Postcommunion will be in either English or French in Canada, but remain in Latin in the United States.

### MISSALS BEING MADE READY

This date was chosen to give bishops a chance to get home before the third session of the Vatican council, scheduled to start about Nov. 30, to lead in the final preparations for the changes in their respective dioceses. Meanwhile, altar missals and other necessary materials will be made ready.

Besides in the Mass, the plan provides for the use of English and French for baptisms, confirmations and weddings; for the bishop's allocation before each order of ordination; for the sacrament of the anointing of the sick, and for funeral, benediction of the Blessed Sacrament and Forty Hours' devotion; for the blessing of candles on Feb. 2, blessing and imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday, and for much of the Holy Week liturgy, including the blessing of palms and the Palm Sunday procession, the blessing of the holy oils and the washing of feet of Holy Thursday, the liturgical service on Good Friday in honor of the Passion and Death of Our Lord, and the Paschal vigil service.

**LORD'S PRAYER**  
The priest will recite the Offertory hymn in the vernacular, and then continue in Latin until the end of the Preface. The priest will then lead the people in reciting the Sanctus in the vernacular.

**UNDER THE** new plan, translations approved for use in English-language parishes are, in general, those to be used in the United States. They include the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine edition of the Bible, the daily missals commonly in use, and a ritual of the Sacraments being prepared in the U.S.
