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Giants Surprise Red Wings Score Three Runs to Win

Georgetown Giants scored three runs in the bottom of the seventh inning to earn a 3-2 victory over Hamilton Red Wings in a Halton county league game here.

The victory was the second in a row for the Giants and prevented Red Wings from moving into second place, Oakville Wings and Oaks are battling for the loop's senior berth in OMA playdowns.
