Six Hits Boost Hall To 3rd Best Average

Oakville's Murray Hall picked up six hits in ten trips to the plate during the past week to move into third place in the Halton County League batting race.

Hall's average jumped to .354, his highest since he led the league hitters early in the season.

Ordinarily a right fielder, Hall has filled in as shortstop for the Oaks and took time out to pitch a no-hitter against Georgetown earlier this year.

Another Oak centre fielder, Larry Curtis made an even bigger jump. He picked up eight hits in 11 trips as his average soared from .294 to .340 and he moved into fifth place.

Campbellville's Ken Moore and Earl Cairns continued to hold down first and second places. Moore heads the pack with a .383 average.

Cairns is second at .375 and still leads the circuit in home runs with seven. Milton second baseman Don Currie is the league's 4th batter at .347.

Siu King, Stan Henderson, Al Wingrove and Don Joyce of Campbellville and Bill Currie of Milton are the other five hitters in the top ten list.
