

# Set Hunting Seasons For Game in This Area

Many outdoormen take part in their annual excursions in the hills. Some prefer to fish when lakes are less crowded with fishermen, and the weather is crisp and clear. Some hunters like to get in on special days, and spend as much time as possible in pursuit of woodland game, deer and waterfowl.

October may seem a long way off, but holidays have to be planned well in advance and the following list of seasons is provided so that arrangements may be made now.

**Quail** — (black, grey or fox squirrels) — counties of Huron, Bruce, Grey, Halton, Oxford, Perth, Waterloo, Wellington, York, Simcoe, and West Flamborough townships in the county of Wentworth: Oct. 21, 1964 to Feb. 28, 1965. Counties of Bruce and Grey and Huron County except townships of Stanley, Hay and Uxbridge: Sept. 9, 1964 to March 31, 1965. Township of Saltfleet, Ancaster, Blenheim and Grandview in Wentworth County: Oct. 23, 1964 to Feb. 28, 1965. Bag limit on cottontail only — six per day.

**Squirrel** — (black, grey or fox squirrels) — counties of Huron, Bruce, Grey, Halton, Oxford, Perth, Waterloo, Wellington and Wentworth: Oct. 3 to Dec. 15, 1964. Bag limit, 10 per day.

**Fox and raccoon** — no closed season. Special licenses are required to hunt fox, rabbit and pheasant in regulated townships.

**Pheasant** — Counties of Huron, Bruce, Grey, Halton, Oxford, Perth, Waterloo, Wellington, York, Simcoe, and West Flamborough townships in the county of Wentworth: Oct. 21 to Nov. 7, 1964. Ancaster, Blenheim, Grandview and Saltfleet townships in Wentworth County: Oct. 23 to Nov. 4. Bag limit — three per day, not more than one of which shall be a hen.

**Quilled Crows** — All of Lake Huron District, Oct. 3 to Dec. 15, 1964. Bag limit — five per day. Possession limit 15.

**Deer** — No season announced as yet for Lake Huron District, Perry Sound District, Nov. 3 to Nov. 14, 1964.

**Speckled and Brown Trout** — Lake Huron District, May 1 to Sept. 15, 1964.

**Rainbow Trout** — May 1 to Sept. 15, 1964 — (Special extended season in portions of designated streams in Bruce, Grey and Huron counties to Nov. 30, 1964.

**Pike and Pickerel** — May 15 to March 31, 1965.

**Muskellunge and Bass** (large-mouth and smallmouth): June 1 to Nov. 30, 1964.

### Approve Huttonville OWRC Brampton Water Pipeline

Water from Huttonville should reach Brampton mains by mid-October. It was made public Monday. Construction of the controversial pipeline approved by the Ontario Water Resources Commission will begin shortly. Estimated cost is \$312,800.

## DECREASE OF 424 IN JULY UNEMPLOYMENT

With many plants closed down for vacations during July, employment activity in the area eased off from the brisk pace set during June, when jobs were found for 484 persons. During July 1964, 363 persons were placed in employment by the National Employment Service an increase of 82 placements over the same month last year. The manufacturing industries again provided the most job opportunities, employment having been located for 150 people. The construction industry listed vacancies with this office that resulted in jobs in the Service Industries and thirty-one jobs were filled in the wholesale and retail trade.

There were 1011 persons registered for work at the end of July 1964, a decrease of 624 from the same month last year when there were 1635 persons registered.
