Crash-Landed Here, Flyer is Grounded by Brampton Club

Harold Milton Knox, R.R. 1 Palgrave the RCAF officer cadet who crashlanded a light aircraft in the Georgetown park Wednesday, July 22 has been grounded by the Brampton Flying Club for a year and a half. The plane he brought down here guided by neighbourhood residents in their cars was reeled from the Brampton Flying Club. The grounding was imposed at a flying club board of director's meeting.

A Brampton Flying Club official said the board made it a year and a half because by that time he will have completed his RCAF flight training which will make him a competent pilot. He said the flying club's insurance firm has absorbed the cost of the damage to the plane - \$1,750.

Knox pancaked the plane on the park infield after colliding with the top branches of trees on the east side of the park while making a run at an improvised landing strip. The emergency field was set up by residents in cars with their lights on who realised the pilot was having difficulty and apparently trying to land.

Knox thought Georgetown was Brampton and combed the area flying low and slow without his lights on searching for the landing strip he took off from for almost two hours. Both Knox and his passenger Carol Robinson of Fort Credit escaped injury.

Former OPP Officer Dies at Wasaga Cottage

An Ontario provincial police officer for 34 years until his retirement in 1961, David Rogers of 50 Charles St., Stoney Creek, died at his summer cottage at Wasaga Beach last week. He was 64.

Mr. Rogers headed the OPP Hamilton detachment from 1933 until his retirement. He joined the force in 1927 and served in Oakville and Dundas before going to Stoney Creek in 1946.

Surviving are his wife, the former Lorna Campbell of Georgetown, a son Thomas of Winona and a daughter Betty Ann of Stoney Creek, and two grandsons. A police honour guard was present at the funeral service in Streetsville Presbyterian Church on Sunday afternoon.

Renovations at Georgetown Hospital

Georgetown's local hospital is undergoing a number of renovations during the holiday period. One wing has been completely shut down, and among other things, extensive painting is going on. The whole wing is being "freshened up" in various ways and it is expected that the work will be completed end the rooms reopened by September 1st.

A hospital spokesman told the Herald reporter that this is a particularly good time for this type of work, as the bed load is always down in the summer months, and only by completely emptying the wing can this type of work be done. The Hospital will have a full-time Administrator once again, with the arrival of Mr. Fred Whittaker from Iroquois Falls, September 1st.
