Want to buy an ocelot? a monkey? a lizard? or a rare antique love seat? This unusual combination can be found at the "Red Door" in Rockwood, a small shop in a ninety-four-year old building, perched right on the side of highway No. 7.

While his partner "minds the store", Eric Bateman, the owner in the work-day world is a laboratory technician at the Georgetown Hospital, but after hours goes back to look after his assortment of animals. What to get for that girl who has everything? Well, last year nine monkeys were sold as Christmas presents, plus a tremendous number of snakes. The monkey Mr. Bateman has at the moment, is a woolly monkey, a small dainty creature who likes to shell peanuts and hand them to the French poodles who devour them gleefully.

There are also cats, not just ordinary cats, but pure bred silver angoras, blue persians, and a miniature Siamese, who by their aloof expressions, know they are a superior breed.

And then there's the sleek multi-coloured ocelot, who never was palled by your reporter, despite repeated assurances that she was quite tame. "These growling sounds are just her way of talking" said the owner. —Well perhaps. It seems the wild members of the cat family do not purr, but talk in a growling voice instead.

The ocelot, or by her right name, Princess Sheba, is from Brazil, and will be on display at the C.N.E. cat show. They are a wild species, and very rarely bred in captivity. So the wild kittens have to be imported. When tamed as pets they become more attached to the family than a dog, so says Mr. Bateman.

Another interesting fact was revealed by the pet shop owner, French poodles do not come from France, but originated in Northern Russia as a hunting dog. He explained that the unusual manner of clipping poodles is to enable judges to see their body structure, and yet leave enough coat to judge its condition. For example, the poms-poms just below the knee are at a spot where the coat is at its worst, so if the pom-pom at this critical spot is smooth and silky, it may be assumed the whole coat would be excellent.

"Why does anyone buy lizards, iguanas and snakes?" Mr. Bateman was asked. "They make lovely affectionate pets", he replied, while your reporter shuddered.

Due to lack of space at the moment, no large stock can be kept, but he lists 47 different reptiles, 40 types of birds, and a hundred types of reptiles which he can obtain either for an individual or a pet store.
