A piece of the Calgary Stampede is being brought to Georgetown by the Lions Club. It was announced this week.

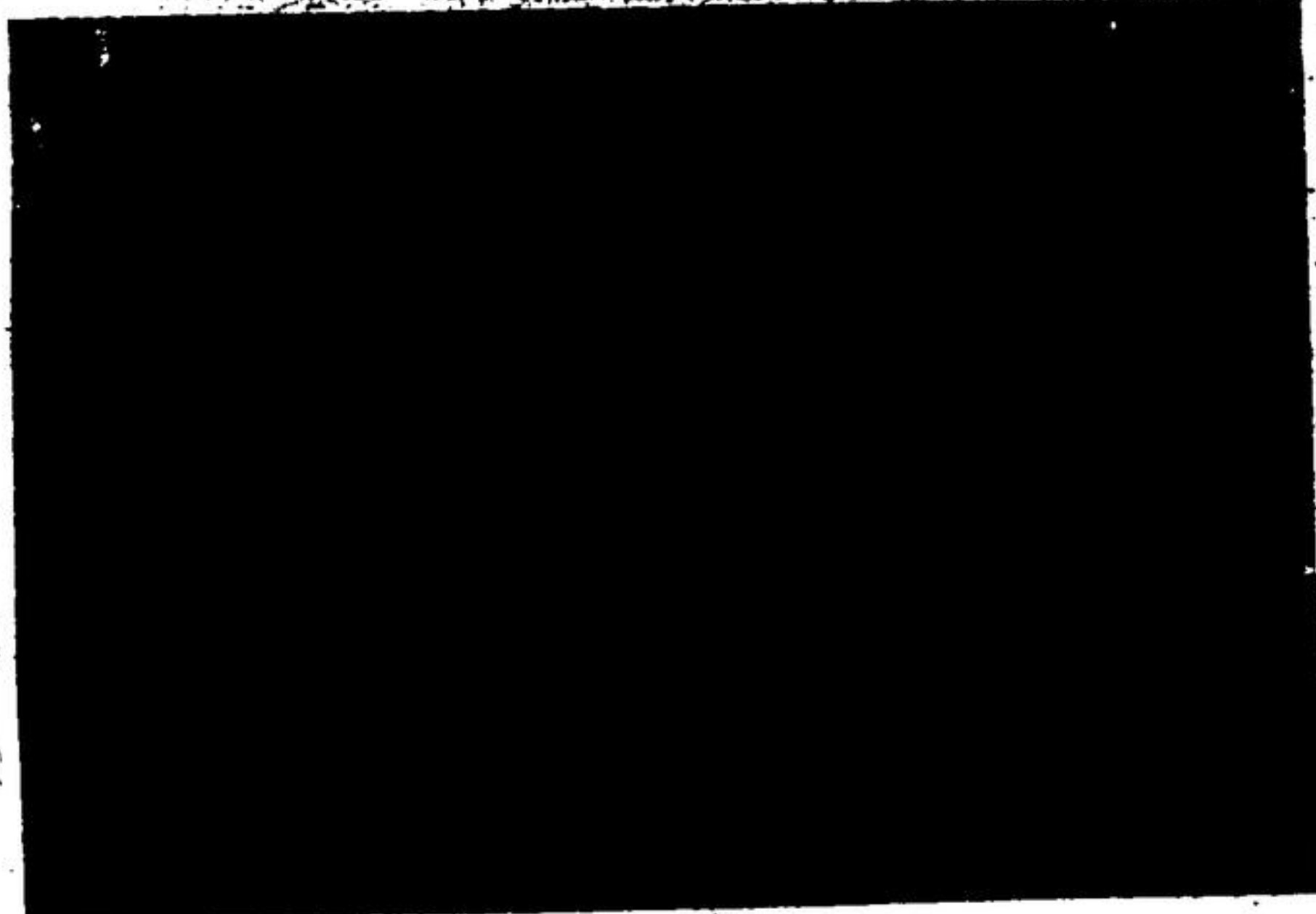
Chuck wagon racing featuring the World's Champ Cliff Claggett of Clinton, British Columbia, and a two hour Stampede show will be the attraction in the Georgetown park Saturday, September 12th.

It is the first venture by the Lions into the western promotion business since they hosted the Ontario Western Horse Association rodeo here three years ago.

Lion Bob Brick is heading the committee of Lions handling the attraction.

Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 50c for students. Seating for 4,000 will be available. Advance tickets will be on sale shortly.

The club is hoping to have the week prior to the show, from Labour Day to the 12th, proclaimed Stampede Week. The chuck wagon races and show will start at 2:30.

were Norm Withnell, John Blakelock, Doug Wilson, Francis Langway, Bill Wilson and Jack Markey. Jerry Achorn, John Turner and Mark Pollock divided pitching chores for that team.

Chris Speyer coached that championship team with the help of Joe Pickard and the 1947 executive had Bob Hunter as president, Don Davis as vice-president, Jim Black as secretary, treasurer Cameron Hillmer and Johnson.

Every member of that team is still alive and many of those players are still active in Oakville sport.

Pollock's brother Ken is still an important Oakville Oak.

Johnson's first taste of executive work came in 1930 when he served as president of the old Lakeshore County League. He helped found the Halton Circuit and served as President of the circuit in the late thirties.

"In the days before cars, every little cross roads had a team," remembers Johnson.

"We played games with Pine Grove, a village that used to be between Bronte and Burlington, Hornby and Palermb," he recalls.

Beavers Sever MHSB Tie New Committee Set Up

A month ago the Halton Intermediate hockey club folded on the brink of disbandment at a public meeting in the arena Rose Room that drew about a dozen spectators. Last Thursday night the Junior B Beavers stood on the same precipice momentarily before being pulled back by a group of local hockey people who responded to written invitations and phone calls to attend the emergency session.

As a result the Georgetown Beavers are no longer the charges of their original handlers headed by resident Syd Alcorn, and their semi-link with the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group has been severed. The Beavers are now the responsibility of a committee headed by Wheldon Emmerson and including Jack Gudgson, Joe Dwyer, Jr., Ross Jackson, Herb Robinson, Art Sheppard, Terry Harley, Fred Harrison, Jim James and a lady member Miss Joy Barber. The number of the committee was not limited at the meeting and will probably swell before an executive is elected.

The above, and former Beavers president Syd Alcorn, were the total responders to some 40 letters and phone calls. They take over the Junior B club with a bank balance of \$175 from the initial year's operation, and a \$2,000 debt owing the Support group. The money was loaned to the club to start the gears turning last season. They're also without a manager since Walter 'Red' Axall resigned the post two months ago.

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Wingrove's .367 Tops League Batting Average

Veteran Al Wingrove of Campbellville took a move from the outfield to catching duties in stride during the past week and moved into the lead in the Halton County League batting race. No Georgetown Giants have yet made it to the top.

Wingrove jacked his average up from .332 to .367 to grab the lead from teammate Ken Moore, who slipped from .383 to .364. The four top hitters and five of the six leaders in the batting race were from Campbellville, but only 27 points separated eighth from first place in the red-hot race.

Another new face near the top of the list is Merchant shortstop Stu King, who took over third place with a .360 average. Campbellville's first baseman Earl Cairns is 4th at .350.

Wingrove's takeover of the lead is a remarkable comeback by the bespectacled veteran whose average hovered near .300 for weeks during a prolonged early season batting slump.

Gun Safety Course is Planned in Georgetown

Hunters are reminded that in addition to a resident's hunting licence, a special township licence is required to hunt pheasants, rabbits and fox in regulated townships of the Province. This special licence is required for all townships of Halton County and for most townships in the immediate area. To avoid difficulties in the field, hunters are urged to know regulations governing game, guns and licences and to be familiar with the boundaries of the area in which a licence is valid.

Under the present licensing system an applicant must submit his expired licence in order to receive a renewal for the current season. In the event that the expired licence has been lost, the applicant must fill out and sign an affidavit stating when his last previous licence was held. Any person of fifteen years of age or over wishing to purchase a resident's hunting licence for the first time, must first pass the hunter safety training course sponsored by
