Mr. and Mrs. Keith Duncan and family are on a three weeks camping trip.

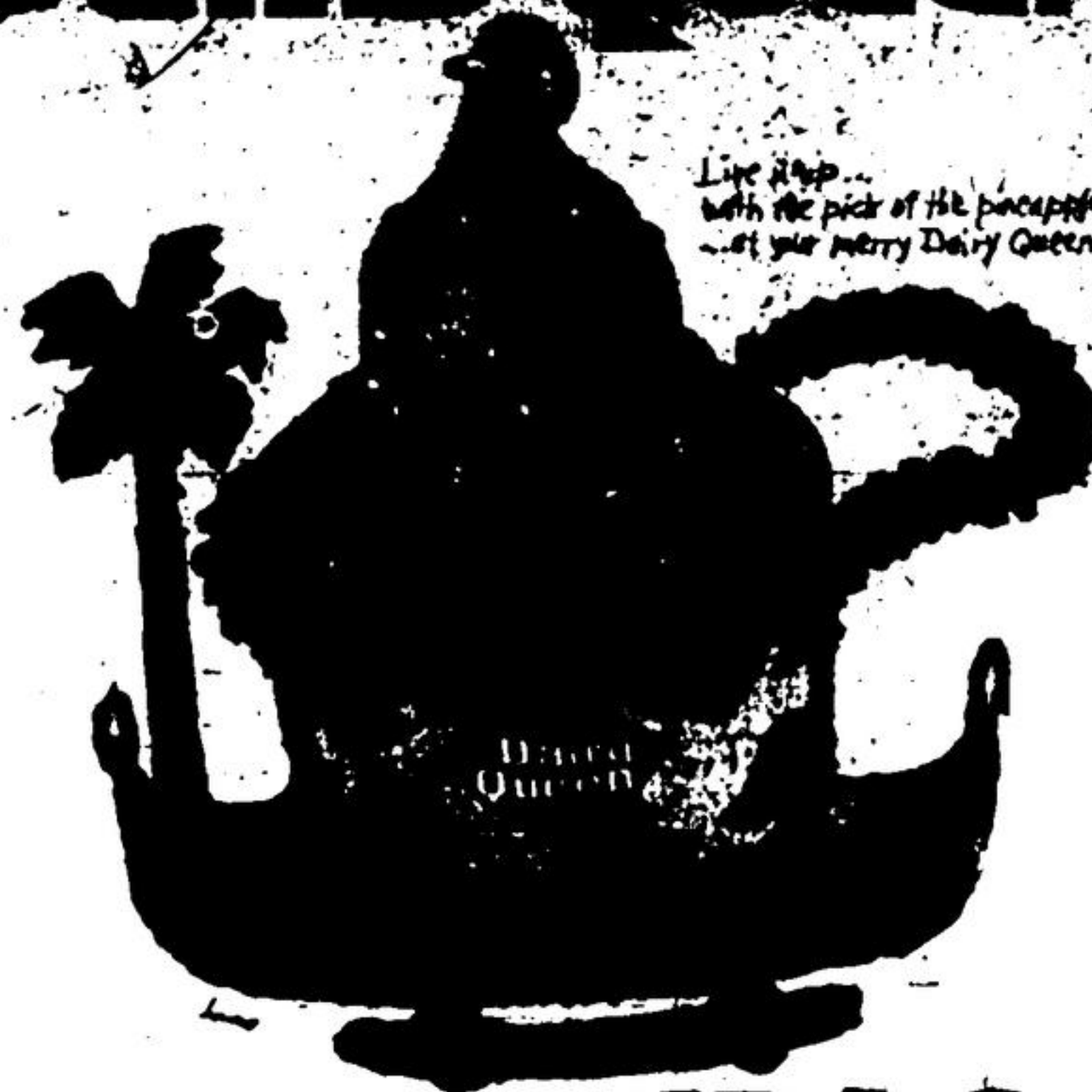
Mrs. I. Coe and daughter, Margie of Pickering are visiting her sister, Mrs. W. Symons.

## 600 Fans at All-Star Sunday Baseball Game

### Guelph C-JOYS Win County All-Star Event

Guelph C-JOYS scored four runs in the first inning off starter John McKenzie and then hung on for a 8-4 victory over Halton County All-Stars before 600 fans at Milton on Sunday.

McKenzie, ace of the Oakville staff, gave up a walk and four singles before All-Star manager Tom Beyers (Oakville) finally lifted him in favour of veteran lefty Jack Roberts (Campbellville).

Roberts gave up one more unearned run in the fourth inning and All-Star pitching checked the Guelph attack the rest of the way.

Player-manager Walt Jeffries led the Guelph attack, rapping a pair of singles and driving in two runs.

In addition, he moved over from first base to pitch reliever Mike Kovac out of a jam after All-Star third sacker Stan Henderson (Campbellville) had ripped a long triple to right field with only one out.

All-Stars were down just one run but Jeffries' junk and slow stuff baffled clean-up hitter Earl Cairns (Campbellville) and Ken Moore (Campbellville).

The veteran first sacker and outfielder both struck out.

McKenzie started the game by walking John Skinner, the mini-sized shortstop product of Burlington Minor Baseball.

Skinner moved to second on a passed ball and scored the first Guelph run when Walt Jeffries singled. McKenzie set

down the next two batters before C-JOYS shelled him with three more singles.

Walt Jeffries moved to third on a single by right fielder Ted Baker and scored when a throw by catcher Bill Kane (Oakville) sailed into centre field.

Baker stole second and scored on a single by centre fielder Ron Gumbley. When second sacker Gary Jeffries, another Burlington product, singled home Gumbley, Beyers brought in Roberts.

Guelph starter John Wyant, who threw six innings, faced the minimum six batters in the first two innings before All-Stars finally got to him in the third.

Kane walked with one out and then scored on a long triple by Roberts. Wyant kept himself in trouble by walking second sacker Joe Iannuzzi (Hamilton) and Henderson but managed to escape without further damage.

Roberts surrendered what became the winning run in the top of the fourth.

Skinner reached base when Moore dropped his fly in right field with two out, stole second and scored on a single by Walt Jeffries.

All-Stars solved Wyant's slants for another run in their fourth when Moore singled, stole second and scored on a single by centre fielder Murray Hall (Oakville).

Hall went all the way to third when Baker whiffed and

the ball out Wyant set down the next three batters and he was left stranded.

Two more runs in the fifth ended All-Star scoring for the day. First run scored on back to back doubles by second baseman Joe Iannuzzi (Hamilton) and shortstop Rick DiMarchi (Hamilton).

DiMarchi scored on Cairns' single before Wyant closed the door.

Henderson's seventh-inning triple was the only All-Star threat off either Kovac or Jeffries. The Merchant veteran's triple would have been a homer in almost any ballpark with a fence.

Lack of fences neutralized All-Star power while Guelph used to distant fences at home, doesn't make any attempt to park much home run wallop in the batting order.

Dan Cheryak, the erratic Hamilton rookie, was most effective of the three front-line pitchers picked for the All-Stars.

He blanked Guelph on just one single and a walk during the three innings he pitched and no batter got first base against him.

Secondliners Garry Hughes (Oakville) and Harry Hamilton (Campbellville) pitched a hitless inning each to finish the game.

Each team was sloppy in the field, coming up with three errors apiece, but Guelph came up with two double plays.

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## Umps Select Moore Halton Loop MVP

Outfielder Ken Moore of Campbellville Merchants has been selected Most Valuable Player in the Halton County League. It was announced during Sunday's All-Star game.

Umpire in Chief Mike Timmins announced the veteran, having the best season of his career, was given the nod over five other candidates considered by the loop's arbiters.

Moore was presented with the Glen Morden Memorial Award by Sir Moore. The award is for the most valuable and most sportsmanlike player.

Timmins, in announcing selection of Moore, typified him as one of the 'real gentlemen' of the circuit.

In and out of the batting lead all season, Moore is currently second in the race with a .366 average. Usually a right fielder, he has filled in at third base this year.
