

Oaks Win Over Giants Stretches League Lead

Veteran Gary Hughes pitched a single run in the first when Hall was hit by a McGill pitch and scored on a double by Bondy.

Dundas Extra-Inning Runs Oust Midgets From Play-off Berth

The Georgetown White Sox saw their hopes for an O.B.A. berth vanish over the weekend when they met the hard-hitting Dundas team and were best in two straight games.

The Midgets travelled to Dundas on Saturday afternoon and after considerable delay due to no umpires finally started a seven inning game at 5:00 p.m.

Dumas started off the first inning when he reached first base on an error to the third baseman. Peavy struck out. Ron Lane struck out and Mero was given an intentional walk. Riddell singled to load the bases. Alister Blair hit a double to right field and the three base runners scored. Colledge struck out to end the inning.

The Dundas crew jumped right back in their half of the first inning scoring four runs on four hits and one player being hit by the pitcher.

Georgetown picked up one run in the second when Dumas led off with a single, went to second on an error to the short stop in attempting to throwout the batter a first base. On an umpires decision Dumas was allowed to score on the wild throw at first. The White Sox also picked up a single run in the fifth inning.

Dundas exploded in the sixth inning scoring six big runs on seven big hits, two walks and a balk. Three straight hits by the Dundas crew led coach Tracy Barrager to lift starter Mike Toal in favour of reliever Mike Dwyer. Dwyer balked on his attempt to pick off the runner at first and a run was sent home. The next batter got a single to load the bases again. Dwyer walked the next Dundas man to walk the winning run home. Dundas got three more hits and another walk, before the White Sox crew were able to put them out.

Georgetown had six hits and six runs, Dundas had ten hits and seven runs.

The return game was played

in Georgetown on Sunday, a nine inning affair that saw Dundas win the game in extra innings.

Georgetown started off fast again getting two runs in the first inning and matching Dundas in the third when both teams collected two runs. Dundas had a big fifth inning, scoring four runs on two hits, two walks and an error to the centre fielder when he dropped a fly ball with the bases loaded.

It was a close game with both teams evenly matched and the score was seven all after the nine innings. In the tenth, Dundas' first batter led off with a single, and they scored two runs on two more hits and a walk.

Would Condense Procedural By-Law — Too Complicated

Early this year council gave first reading to a lengthy procedural by-law which would set a pattern for council to follow at their meetings.

A second reading was passed at a recent council meeting, but indications are that the by-law will have a stormy path when it comes to a final reading. If it becomes law, it will certainly be in a verbatim considerably reduced form.

Town councillors, Mayor Gibbons and Cr. Hildebrandt found so much wrong with the by-law that they voted against the second reading. Several others, while voting for it, indicated they would go no farther until it had been discussed and changed.

Cr. Hildebrandt doesn't want to limit ratepayers appearing before council by demanding prior notice. A year ago this

was tried, found unworkable and finally abandoned.

Reeve Elliott criticizes a clause which limits a councillor to one speech on any motion. A man should be entitled to one rebuttal, he says.

Mayor Gibbons wants much simpler legislation than the cumbersome document under study. Such a by-law can be a hindrance rather than a help, he said.

Deputy Reeve Hunter also wants councillors to be able to speak more than once to a motion, and sides with the mayor in reducing the by-law to something "no more than 3 pages long."

Cr. Hildebrandt said council could never follow all the rules set forth. A clause that meetings end at 11 p.m. has already been found unworkable this year, he points out. But Cr. Don Powers main
