### TOWNSHIP OF ESQUESING ROAD CLOSING

Proposed by-law to authorize the closing of part of the original road allowance between the east half of Lot 10 and the east half of Lot 11 in the said Township, by measurement 0.263 acres be the same, more or less.

NOTICE IS HEREBY given that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Esquesing proposes on Monday, the fifth day of October, 1964 at the hour of 8 o'clock in the afternoon, or as soon thereafter as it may deem advisable, to authorize the closing of that part of the original road allowance as described as follows:

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of Esquesing in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of the Original Road Allowance between the east half of Lot 10 and the east half of Lot 11 in concession 11 in the said Township, containing by measurement 0.263 Acres be the same, more or less and which said parcel of land is particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that the centre line of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario Right of Way crossing part of the East halves of said Lot 10 and 11 has a bearing of North 21 degrees - 57 ft. - 00 in. West and relating all bearings herein thereto;

COMMENCING at the west angle of the east half of said Lot 10;

THENCE North 39 degrees -

23 ft. - 10 in. East, along the north-west limit of the east half of said Lot 10 being also the south-east limit of the said Original Road Allowance, 260.25 Feet to a point therein;

THENCE North 40 degrees - 45 ft. - 20 in. West across the said Original Road Allowance, 67.00 Feet more or less to the point of intersection of the north-west limit of the said Original Road Allowance with the line of a fence running north-westerly and marking the existing north-east limit of the lands of the Norval Cemetery;

THENCE South 39 degrees - 23 ft. - 10 in. West, along the said north-west limit of the said Original Road Allowance being also the south-east limit of the east half of said Lot 11, 374.22 Feet more or less to the south angle of the east half of the said Lot 11;

THENCE South 44 degrees - 43 ft. - 40 in. East along the centre line of said concession and also the north-east part of the west half of said Lot 10, 68.35 Feet more or less to the point of commencement.

The proposed By-law and plan showing the lands to be affected may be seen in my office at R.R. 1, Georgetown. The Council will hear in person or by his counsel, solicitor or agent, any person who claims that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the said By-law and who applies to be heard.
