

## Testimonial Dinner and Gifts For Retired Hydro Superintendent

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### Cultivation Controls Ox-Eye Daisy Weed

Ox-eye Daisy and the Hawkweeds, which include Orange Hawkweed and King devil, are perennials that have spread to this country from Europe and the Field Crop Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture states that they are especially troublesome in pastures and hayfields, which cannot be plowed and brought under a short crop rotation.

Ox-eye Daisy, a relative of the chrysanthemum has short, thick root stalks which show great vitality, with many stems growing from one root. The plant grows from six inches to three feet in height and the flowers, which are quite attractive, are one to two inches across with bright yellow centres and white edges. Even weeds can be beautiful! In fact I have known housewives, who had such admiration for daisies to pull them up by the roots and transplant in their favorite flower garden.

Orange Hawkweed is often called Devil's Paint Brush because of its bright orange-red flowers borne in clusters on the top of a nearly leafless stem that grows from twelve to eighteen inches high. This weed is a great problem in permanent pastures in Northern Ontario.

King Devil is troublesome mainly in Eastern Ontario. It is much like Orange Hawkweed but may be distinguished by

All these weeds are easily killed by cultivation. Infested hay and pasture fields should be plowed. The current year's growth may be killed by one application of 8 oz. of 2,6 D acid per acre in late July or early September. To kill the roots, however, several treatments of 16 oz. of 2,4,D per acre must be applied. Mowing, of course, will prevent seeds from ripening.

It should be remembered that these rates of 2,4,D will also kill clovers and alfalfa, although the grasses will be unharmed. It is practical to spray these weeds, therefore, only when they are present in pure or nearly pure grass stands.
