Milton Revives Curling With New \$100,000 Rink

Part of Milton's history is being revived. Years ago curling was one of the chief pastimes, but the sport died out at the turn of the century. Now, the ice has been broken, so to speak, by a band of 10 enthusiasts, who got together in January and decided to build such a club. Three weeks ago construction got underway. Excavations completed, workmen poured the concrete footings last week. The club, which will cost \$100,000, is expected to be opened about October 15th. Situated in Millside Plaza near the CN station, it will include four sheets of ice, plus club house facilities. Following a public subscription campaign earlier in the year 200 people were made shareholders. Officials will be appointed at a meeting yet to be arranged.
