

CITIZENS' BAND WINS IN SECOND TRY AT EX

Civic praise was heaped on Georgetown Citizens Band Sunday night. A hestily called open air concert in the Delrex Market Centre drew hundreds of music lovers to hear Mayor Joseph Gibbons extend the town's congratulations on a first place win at the Canadian National Exhibition.

And the bend played a varied concert, which included their test pieces which won them the Whaley-Royce trophy and \$400 on Thursday. Jim Fiddler thanked the meyor for his remarks and Bendmester Art Hilliard was encee for the concert.

Second to Delhi last year, the young musiciens scored 169 points to cop honours last week, In a six-band class, they were followed by Campbellford, 166; Beamsville, 164; Delhi, 163; Yrenton RCAF, 159 and Acton 149.

The Georgetown aggregation competed in Class '3 in which they earned secord place honours last year in their initial bid in CNE competition.

"It was on overall effort," a band official told The Herald. "One of those days when everything went perfectly. Everyone played their best. After all that practice, the boys made sure nobody was going to beat them that day.

Seeks Oil at 1650 ft. Drill Has 550 To Go

president of Anthony Gas and Oil Explorations, is anxiously awaiting his second oil strike at Hornby.

The drill is presently down to. the 1100 foot level. Seynuck gaid that the drill should encounter oil when it gets past 1650 feet.

The hole presently being drilled is located on the farm of Harold Scott on the Ninth Line. Drilling has been going on for

the last three weeks. At a hole drilled earlier in the summer, Seynuck obtained 2,000 gallons of crude oil. The hole was located on the farm of George Hall, north of the

hole now being drilled. Seynuck said that he expects to hit a bigger reservoir of oil on the bole presently being sunk than on the previous one.

Seynuck plans to pump the first bole in about a week's time. After Seynuck numped 2,000 gallons of oil from the first well he ceased pumping well again, he plans to sell all. and forced an acid solution the oil - including the 2,000 down the hole. Since the add was applied in July, Seynuk has been waiting for oil to seep back into the underground oll well.
