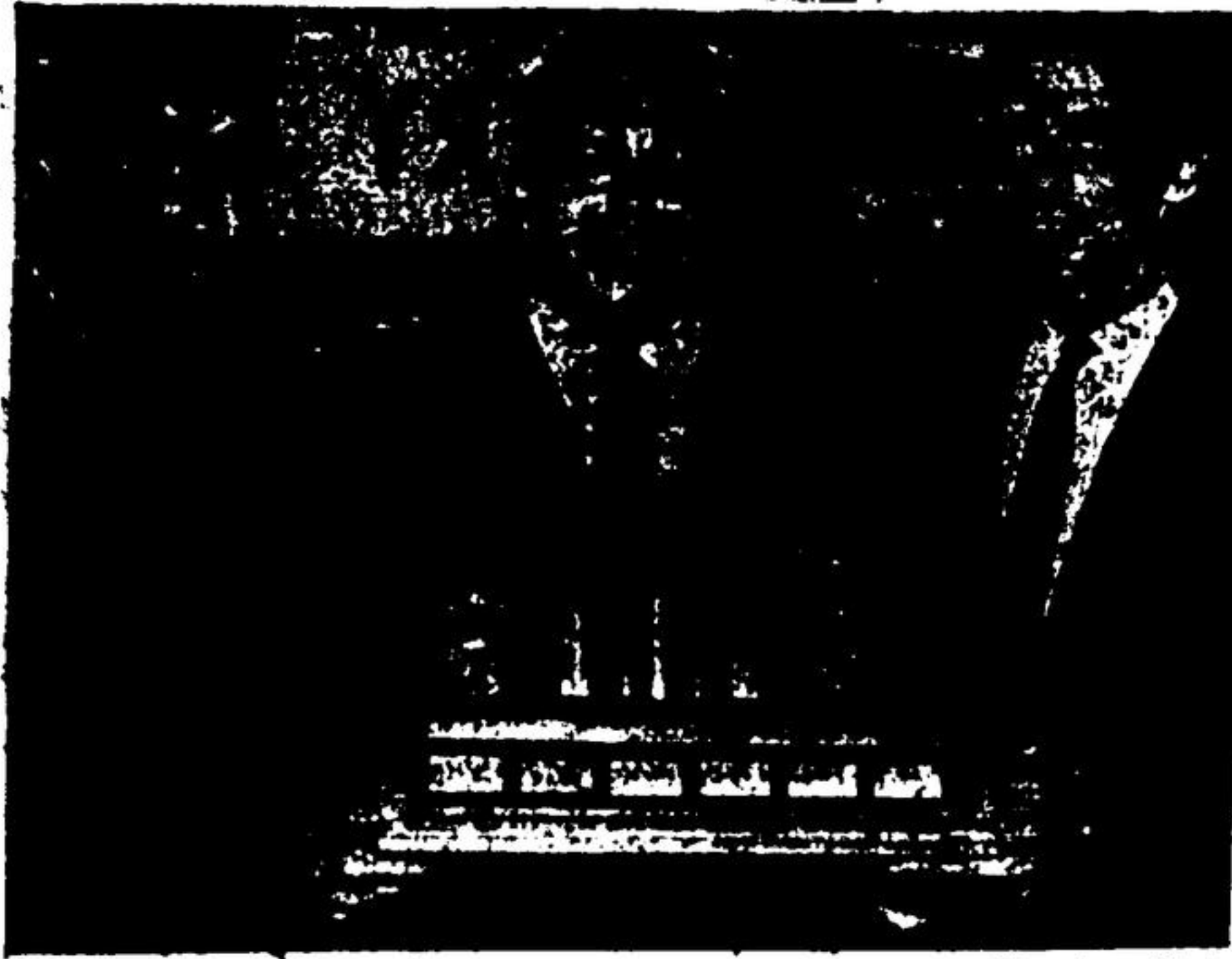


Came, Played and Conquered

Council Opinion Divides on Overhead Water Storage

Council some time ago indicated an interest in financing the \$230,000 expenditure under an improvement plan set up by the provincial government. A portion of the cost would be borne by the province this way.
