## Georgetown District HIGH SCHOOL BUS ROUTES 1964-1965

STUDENTS OF GEORGETOWN HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT ARE ASKED TO NOTE THE FOLLOWING TRANSPORTATION SCHEDULE:

**ROUTE 1:** North from School on 8th line to 22 Sideroad, West on No. 22 sideroad to 7th line, South on 7th line to 17 sideroad, West on 17 sideroad to 4th line, south on 4th line to 15 sideroad; East on 15th sideroad to 7th line; leave Stewarttown 8:15 a.m.; South on 7th line to 10 Sideroad; East on 10 sideroad to 8th line; north on 8th line to school.

**ROUTE 2:** North to Glen Williams; Leave Glen Williams 8:20 a.m.; East on 20 sideroad to 10th line; South on 10th line to 17 sideroad; east on 17 sideroad to Town Line, south on Town Line to Norval station; North on Town line to Terra Cotta; leave Terra Cotta at 8:05 a.m.; west on 27 sideroad to 10th line; South on 10th line to 27 sideroad; west on 27 sideroad to 9th line; South on 9th line to school.

**ROUTE 3:** Glen Williams; Wheeler's Store 8:20 a.m., to school.

**ROUTE 4:** East on Highway 7 to 9th line; South on 9th line to 10 sideroad; East on 10 sideroad to Town line; North on Town line to Norval; leave Norval (Carney's Store) at 8:35 a.m.; West to School.

**ROUTE 5:** Leave B.A. station, East Georgetown 8:40 a.m., West to school.

Students will complete Bus Privilege Application Forms. Parents of students in Esquensing Township are requested to pay particular attention to items 2 and 3 of application forms, e.g., Lot number, whether east or west half of lot and Concession number. Application forms will be distributed by the bus drivers during the first week.

Eight of the remaining eleven members of Brantford's unique Klondyke Club met at the Hotel Kerby Friday night to keep true to their 1937 pledge "to meet annually until the last member sat alone."

The club, one of the city's most prominent sports and social clubs before the turn of the century, takes in no new members. At the first annual meeting held in 1937 there were 72 men.

Wearing yellow and black striped ties - the colors of the Klondyke Club - the elderly men ate a hearty dinner, leaned back and, as one member put it, "socialized."

They elected a new slate of officers, too.

"It is just like the old times. I've had it two or three times before," said newly-elected president George Clester, 76, of Brantford.

He takes over the reins from Herb Fowler, 81, also of Brantford.

The club was formed in 1897 by a group of young men who were walking the streets and hanging around the corners on a bitter winter night because there was little else to do.

One said: "Let's start a club." So a club was formed.

When they moved into their first clubhouse - a loft over a livery stable - someone commented: "It's as cold as the Klondyke up here!" The name stuck.

To be a member one had to be a top athlete. The club was noted for its lacrosse, hockey and baseball teams.

Oldest person present last night was Harry Odell of Brantford, an honorary member who will be 88 on Feb. 8 next year. He was at the Klondyke once. "I will be back here next year," he said. "Maybe for three or four years anyway."

Other members attending were Ernie Swift, 87, of Simcoe; Ab Howard, 78, Pete James, 72, Les Kaufman, 85 and Mr. Fowler, 81 all of Brantford.
