MAJORITY OF AUGUST PUPILS PASS TESTS FOR SWIMMING

Monday of this week was the testing time for the swimmers enrolled in the Georgetown Community Pool swimming classes with nine seniors, twenty intermediates, fifty five Juniors, and sixty beginners emerging victorious.

Here's a sample of the demanding examinations. Seniors were given water safety knowledge tests, and examined in teaching assists, artificial respiration, shallow diving, 100 yds side or breast stroke, 100 yds elementary back stroke, or crawl, 100 yds front crawl or freestyle, 25 yds jump into deep water 25 yards arms only on the back, 50 yards legs only on the back, running dive, surface dive and underwater swim subject, drownproofing.

Lower classes were given progressively less rigorous tests. At the opposite end of the scale the beginners were faced with water safety knowledge test, teaching assists, open eyes under water, bobbing six times, jellyfish float, front slide and roll over, swim 30 ft and stand up turn about, and stand up, lump in swim in place or tread water for 30 seconds.

Georgetown Beavers will play in an OMA Junior C group this winter.

The club which entered the Metro Junior B circuit in its initial year last year, finished in last place, mainly because of three scorers that handicapped them from the start — lack of size, lack of experienced Junior players, and, later in the season, a string of injuries.

The Junior B club was operated by the Georgetown Support Group personnel functioning as a separate executive with affiliation with the Montreal Canadiens. There has been no statement from the Montreal office on the switch, but it is unlikely they will continue their link with a Junior C club.

The Beavers' 1963-64 officers under president Sid Alcorn handed over the reins to their successors when a new slate was elected by the hockey men attending a meeting Wednesday night. The president is Joe Scotty Patterson, secretary Joe Dwyer, Jr., treasurer Steamer Emerson, and directors Bill Smith, Roy Warwick, Welburn Marchmont, Sid Alcorn, Art Sheppard, Herb Robinson, Don Jarvis, Jim Brunner, and Bill Korrick.

The decision to go C this season followed a lengthy discussion. A vote found the majority in favour.

Georgetown will enter an Ontario Hockey Assn. Junior C group with Orangeville, Hempel, Preston, New Hamburg, Elmira and Milton, also a new entry this season.

The National League started the finals last week with the Braves and Giants playing a 7-0 game, the Braves coming out on top.

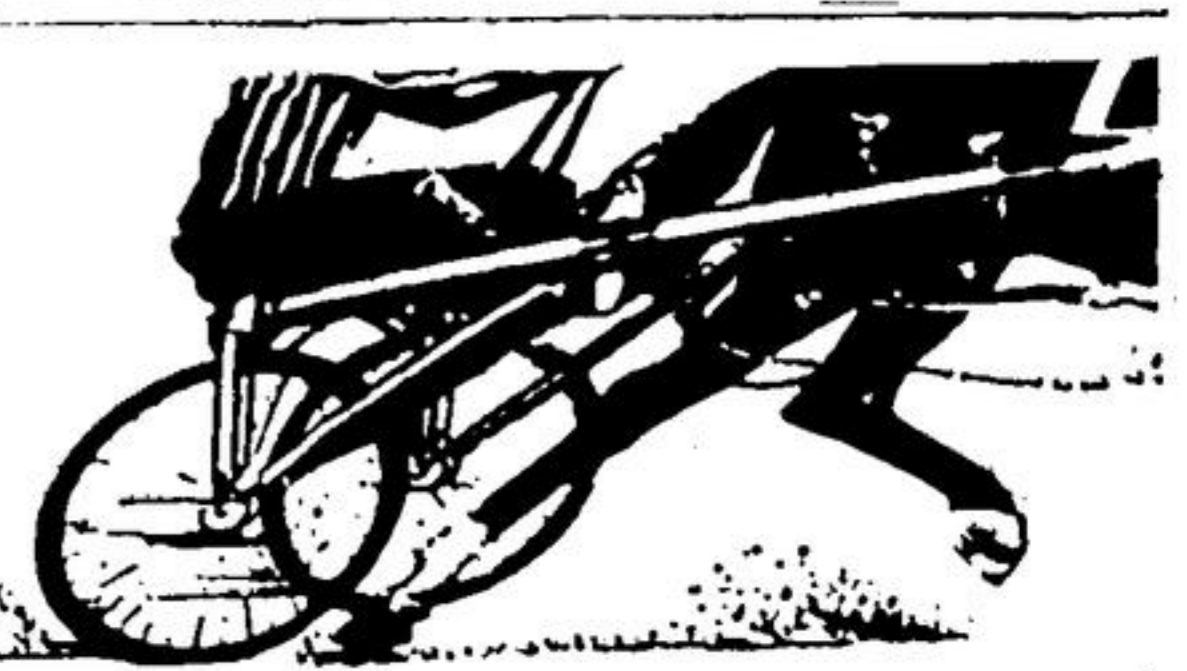

Dryden scored the first run on Kane's single and Burke scored when shortstop Paul Lawson, covering third, let Burke's throw get by him.

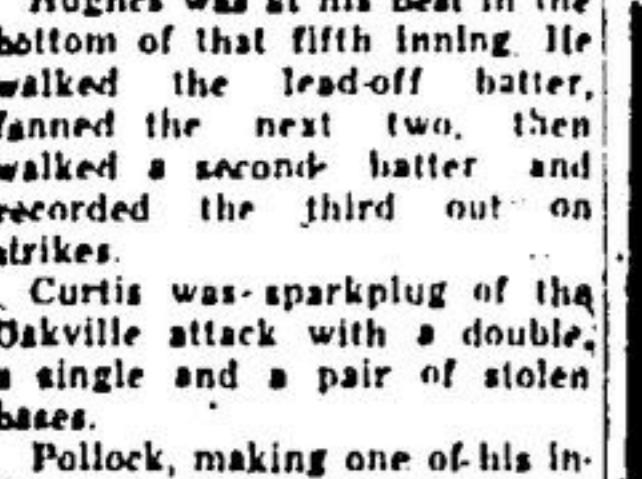
A sacrifice fly in the fifth by Dryden scored the winner. Centre fielder Larry Curtis singled to start the inning, while second and scored on Dryden's fly.
