Not Out For Buggy Ride, These Cowboy Guys Play For Keeps

"These guys aren't out for a quiet buggy ride. They'll be doing everything they can to win the \$500 prize money and important points toward the International Grand Championship." So spoke Leon Bob Brick, chairman of the Chuck Wagon Race committee which is handling the piece of the Calgary Stampede which moves into town Saturday, Sept. 12th, referring to the drivers in the chuck wagon races.

"They're aggressive and once a race is underway it's every man for himself. It's seldom an event finishes without at least one spill," he said.
The chuck wagon races and the sport's world champ, Cliff Claggett are on a swing eastward following their success at the Calgary Stampede. North Bay crowds will be getting a look at the race and accompanying westerns show just before they come here.

The Georgetown Lions learned of the show from Claggett's Ontario representative Tom Bishop, an old friend of the club's through his association with the rodeos sponsored by the Lions here a few years ago. Bishop is a former trick rider but rodeo crowds probably better remember his sister, then Lorna Bishop, a barrel racing participant.

"The show is on a four month tour and every stop to date has brought out big crowds," Brick said. "When it's all over, the top driver gets something like \$3,000.00."
The chuck wagon course is unique. The horses, wagons and drivers start weaving around barrels in a tight course on the infield and climax the event by rearing their horses onto the track for the final lap. When they hit the backstretch they can reach 45 miles per hour. The races are run off in three heats.

Chairman Brick said some 70 horses, drivers, and other performers connected with the show will arrive in town either the night before or on the morning of the races.
"You'll know they're here," he said. "We'll have the busiest sections crawling with westerners."
