Don't Overburden Industry...

Controversy over rebates allowed to Industrial firms on their 50% sewer service surcharge on water bills has taken a great portion of the town council's time recently.

Originally the surcharge which four major Industries pay was sat by an engincritical of the method and it is now council's Intention to establish how much water is returned to the sanitary sawers by a system of double metering. Meters will be installed to machines which use water for cooling and other industrial purposes, this will be deducted from the plant's total water consumption and the surcharge paid on the balance. The same privilege will be extended to any water user, providing he instals the extra meter at his own expense.

The plan seems to be sensible and we can see no reason why it should not satisfy everyone.

But a ratepayers group, with Yed Francis as spokesman, is now insisting that the actual sewage must be metered. And Mr. Francis, when he spoke to council last week,
