Bonnie attended public school at Ballinfad, and is a graduate of Fergus High School.

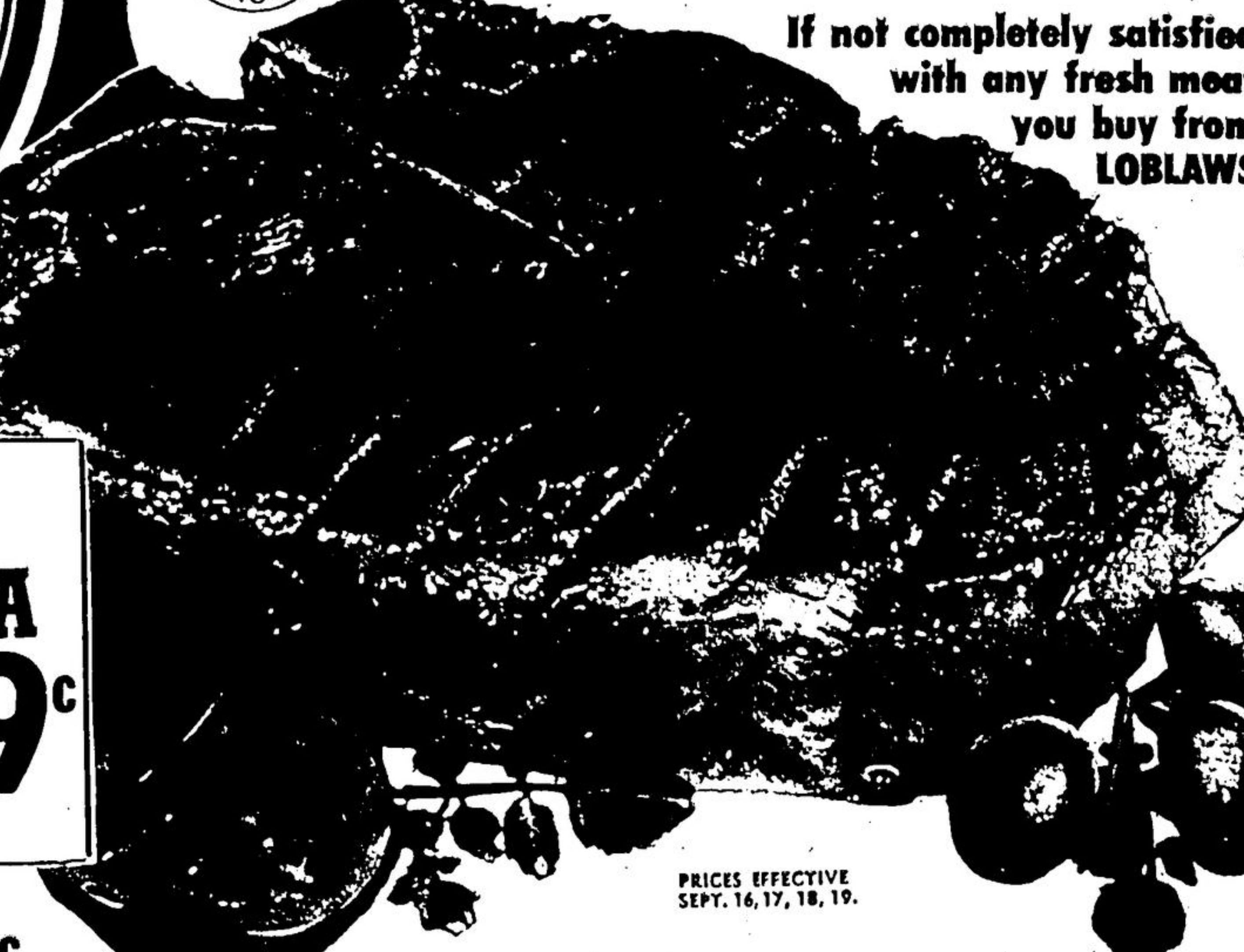
Her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Allen and cousins Elizabeth and Evelyn, 47 King St. E. attended the graduation.
