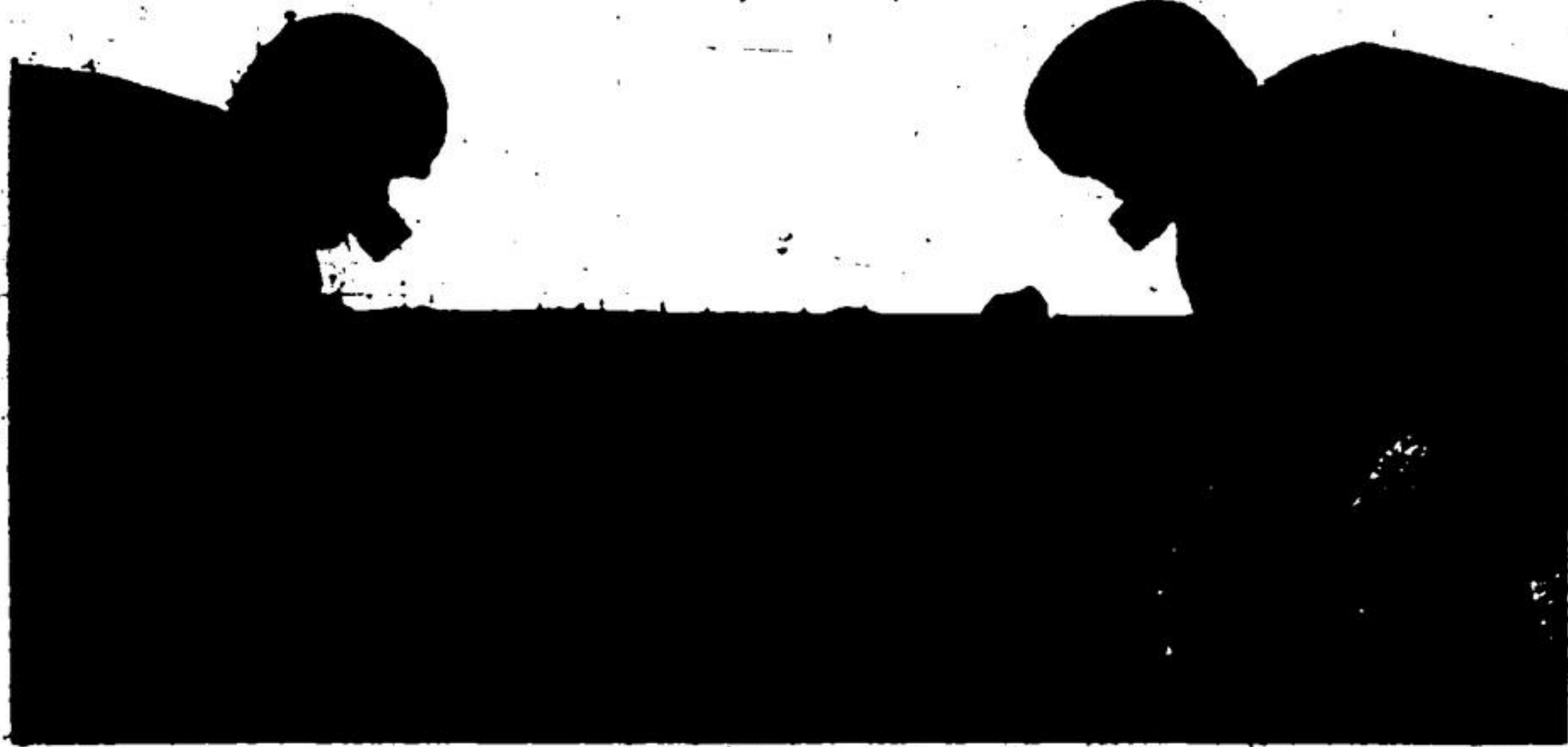

## Beavers, Camp Borden Rated Teams to Beat

Beavers completed their pre-season schedule Sunday, Sept. 6 with a 5-3 win over Toronto Nomads at Georgetown Park. It was a very scrappy encounter with many fumbles, dropped passes and broken plays. Neil Beavers benefited much although Beavers' defence was thoroughly tested several times in the 2nd half and held firm, the 3 points against them being the result of a penalty kick.

The team Beavers fielded last Sunday was very weak at Regulars Newman, Barber, Yuston, Klensuber, Ray and Beacham were missing and these players form the core of the offensive unit but a good improvement will be required from the rest of the squad if Beavers are to be the power house of the league this fall.

Beavers only score was by Dave Cokewell who crashed over from the 5 yd line after stealing the ball from the arms of a defender. The convert was good and kicker Les Judge seems to be as accurate as last year. The previous Sunday, Beavers played a strong game to defeat Toronto Saracens 10-6 so they will play their season opener undefeated.

## Set Hunting Seasons and Bag Limits for Halton

1964-65 hunting seasons and bag and possession limits for Ontario game species have been decided by the Department of Lands and Forests and those applying to main species occurring in Halton County have been released to The Herald by Ted Ackert, Halton County Conservation Officer.

Generally the new seasons for Halton are the same as last year with only slight variances in the opening and closing dates. Rabbits and squirrels are expected to be plentiful in most sections of the County. Pheasants, although abundant below highway No. 3 where they may not be hunted, are scarce in the remainder of the County. Fox, although not plentiful, are present while ruffed grouse are fairly abundant in certain areas.

The 1964-65 seasons and possession limits for the more popular game animals and birds in Halton County are as follows:

**Pheasants** — may be hunted in the year 1964 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. from the 21st day of October to the 7th day of November, both dates inclusive.

No person shall take in one day more than three pheasants not more than one of which shall be a female pheasant.

**Rabbits** — may be hunted or trapped from the 21st day of October, 1964 to the 28th day of February, 1965, both dates inclusive.

No person shall hunt more than six cottontail rabbits in one day.

**Fox** — may be hunted or trapped from the 1st day of October, 1964 to the 30th day of September, 1965, both dates inclusive. (no closed season).

**Squirrel** — (grey, black or fox) may be hunted or trapped from the 3rd day of October to the 15th day of December, both dates inclusive.

No person shall hunt more than an aggregate number of ten squirrels in a day, or possess more than an aggregate number of ten squirrels at one time.

**Ruffed Grouse** — may be hunted in the year 1964 from the 3rd day of October

## Ice A Month Early is Georgetown Arena Plan

Barring a heat wave, Georgetown Memorial Arena will have ice this year earlier than ever before.

The arena board, at a meeting last Thursday decided to start the ice-making process at the end of this month. Their aim is to have an ice surface sometime during the first week of October.

The target date for ice here is almost 25 days earlier than last year when the arena management started pumping brine through the pipes October 20 and had a skating surface by the 25th.

An arena board spokesman said the ice may even be in earlier depending on response to the remaining wrestling cards there are still two wrestling shows left in the summer schedule.

The arena board had hoped to do extensive work on the washrooms and lobby this year but postponed the projects until the arena finances are a little healthier.

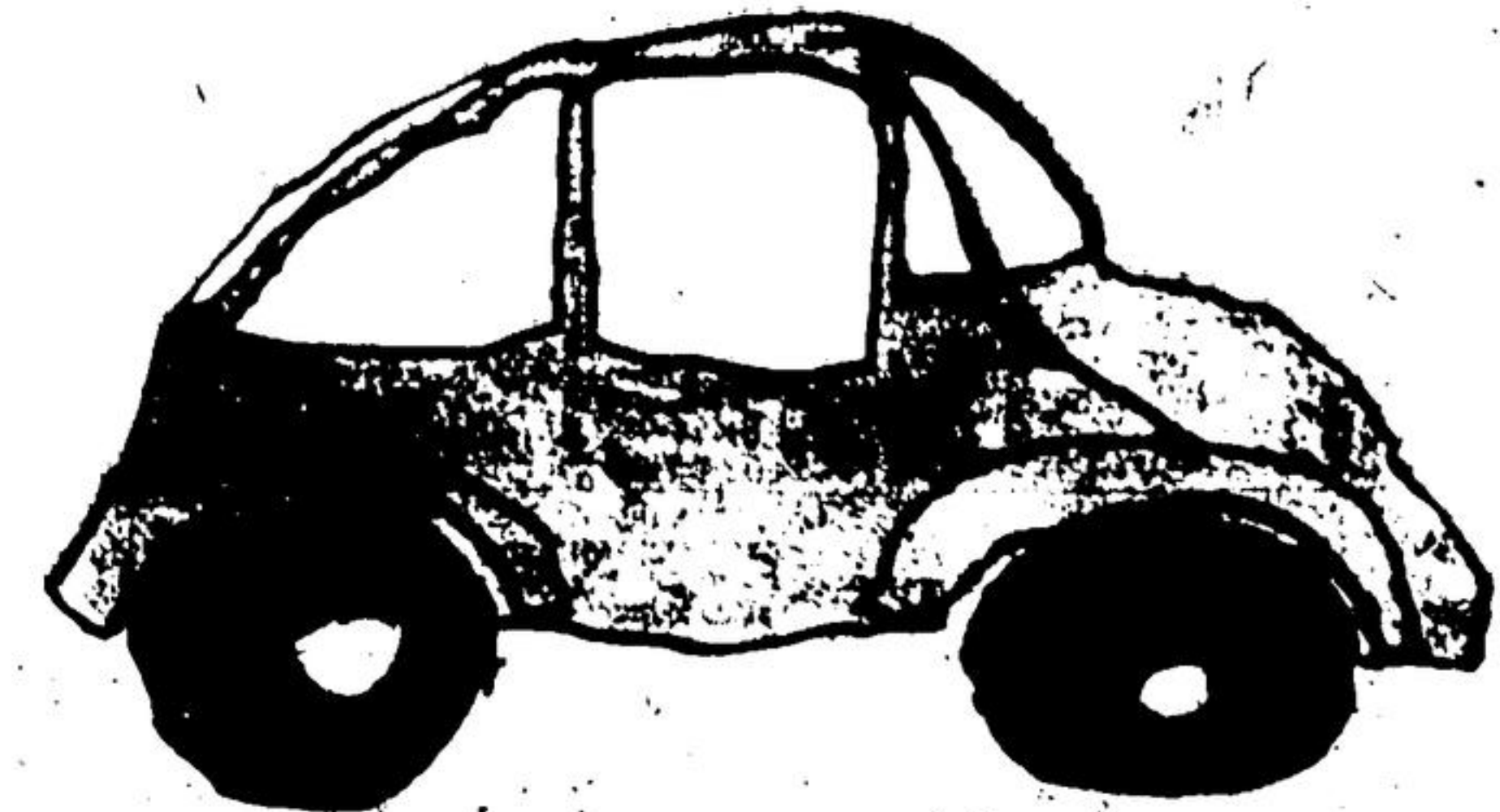
