### Italian Recreation Park Established at Ballinafad

Next spring will see the opening of a fifty acre family picnic ground one mile north of Ballinafad. Patterned after Italian Gardens in Thistleton, this park at the moment is called the Italian Recreation Park, but it is planned to rename it "Family Recreation Park". The land is owned by the Inver Family Association, consisting of seven Italian families, with Valerio Piron as Chairman. Mr. Piron stressed that the park would be open to all. Something for everyone is the aim of the owners. A swimming area one hundred by one hundred and twenty five feet is being constructed; an open air dance floor is planned, picnic tables and a snack bar will be available. Espresso coffee of all kinds will probably be featured. In the Italian tradition, "boce" will be played. This is the Italian version of lawn bowling. In addition, indoor boce, league matches, will be played on a fifty by one hundred foot floor area. Another feature strange to most visitors will be the great pole climb, so popular in Europe. This is exactly what it sounds, an attempt to climb a pole which has been thoroughly greased.

### Diefenbaker Coming To Halton?

Halton County Tories are expecting a record turnout to this year's annual picnic at Lowville Park, North Burlington, Sunday afternoon, Sept. 20th. Interest has been aroused due to the possible attendance of Opposition Leader, John Diefenbaker. Already confirmed as guest speaker is former Agriculture Minister, Alvin Hamilton — of ten described as the former Prime Minister's first lieutenant. While Tory officials have been advised that Mr. Diefenbaker will not officially participate in political meetings held on Sunday, they feel he will take advantage of the opportunity to circulate among the voters. ### Taxi Privileges are Extended for M&M

Permission to operate from a residence on McIntyre Crescent was extended until January 15 to M&M Taxi by council on Monday. Councilors were split on an opinion. Some said that, as the present taxi by law was not in force when the original permission was granted it is not bound by the commercial area clause. And while all agreed that the firm is reputable and there have been no complaints from neighbours, Crs. Hildebrandt and Emmerson voted against the extension, believing it contravenes the by-law. ### School Driver Training Closer, Could be January

A Driver Education course is closer to being part of the Georgetown High School's available extras. At a meeting of the board with the Advisory Vocational Commission Monday trustees heard correspondence that could erase the major hurdle — excessive cost. The Georgetown insurance agents in a letter notified the board that rather than see the course passed up they would be willing to take the two week instructors course themselves and give the driving instruction. Earlier a letter from the Chrysler corporation offered cars should the course be adopted here. "We would certainly be remiss if we didn't investigate this to the limit," board chairman Ed Hall said. If the board finds everything favourable they could introduce the course here as early as January. AVC men James McCaig, E. H. Gorth, and K. Bosizio were appointed a committee to look into the offers and report at a meeting Monday.

### Second Policeman Leaves for Farming

Georgetown is losing a second policeman next month. Monday, Cpl. Dan Whitson submitted his resignation, effective October 10th. Like Evan Rollins, who quit his post last week, Mr. Whitson is taking up full-time farming. The town has already advertised for policemen and will now select two new men from the applicants.

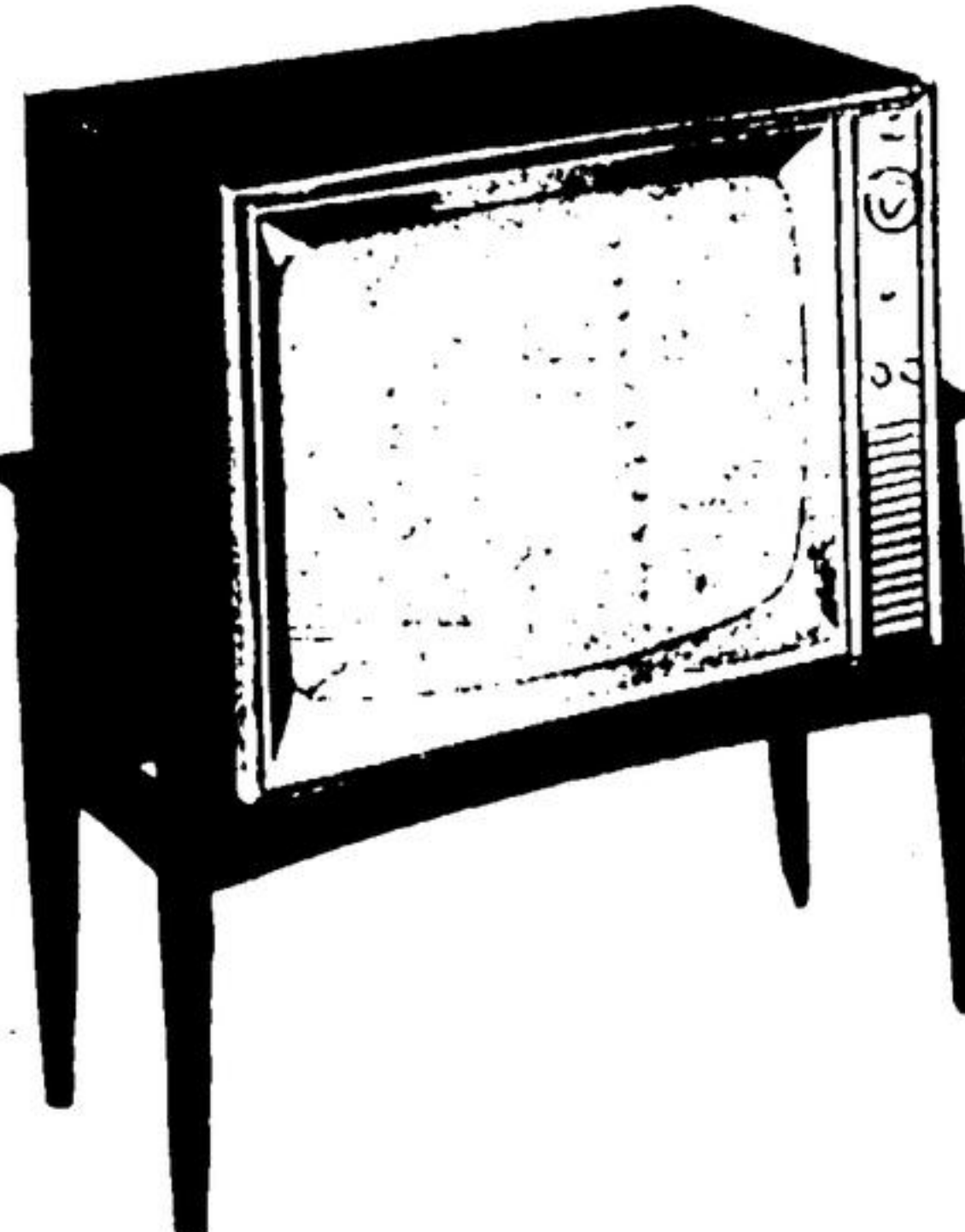

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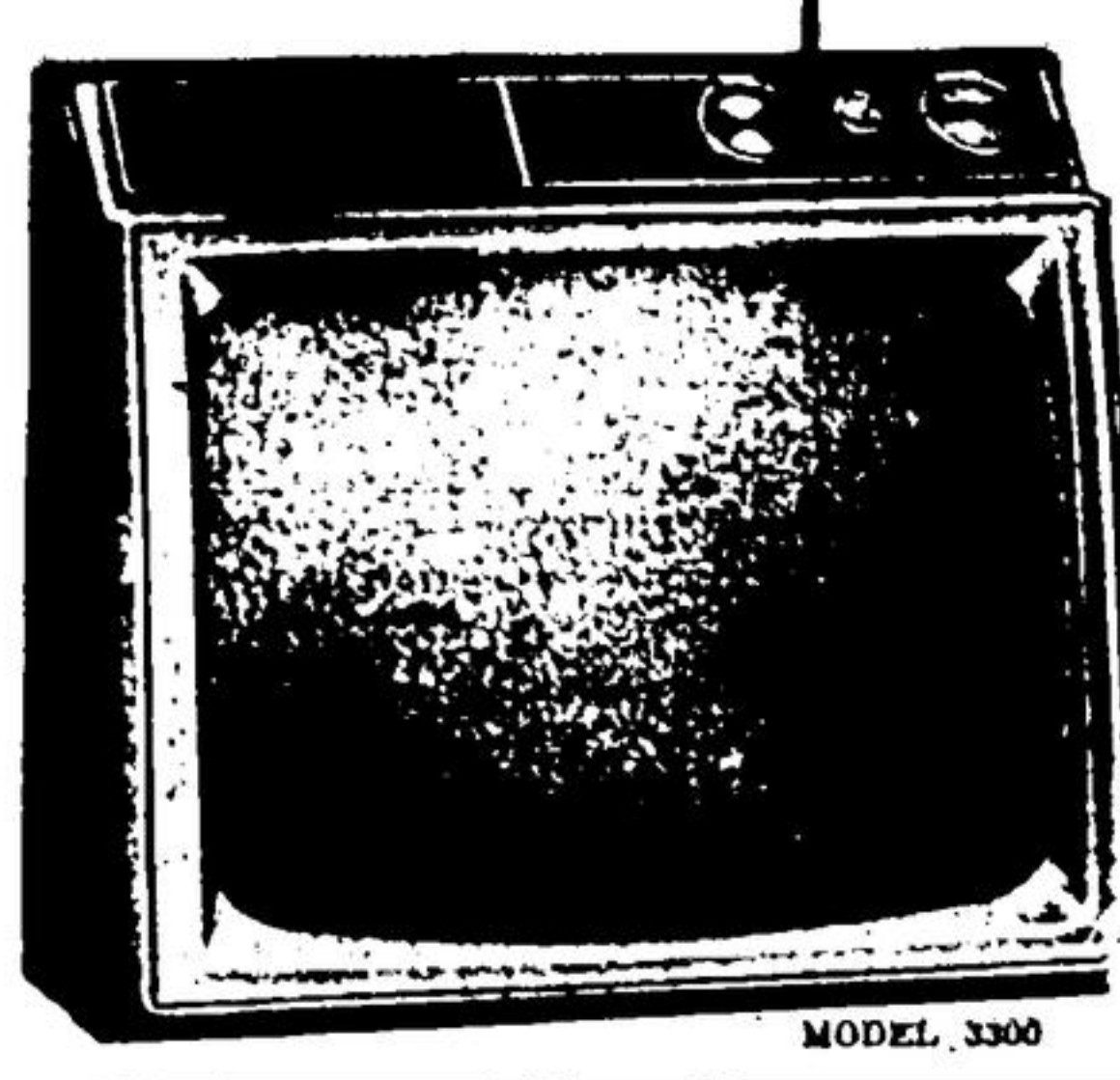
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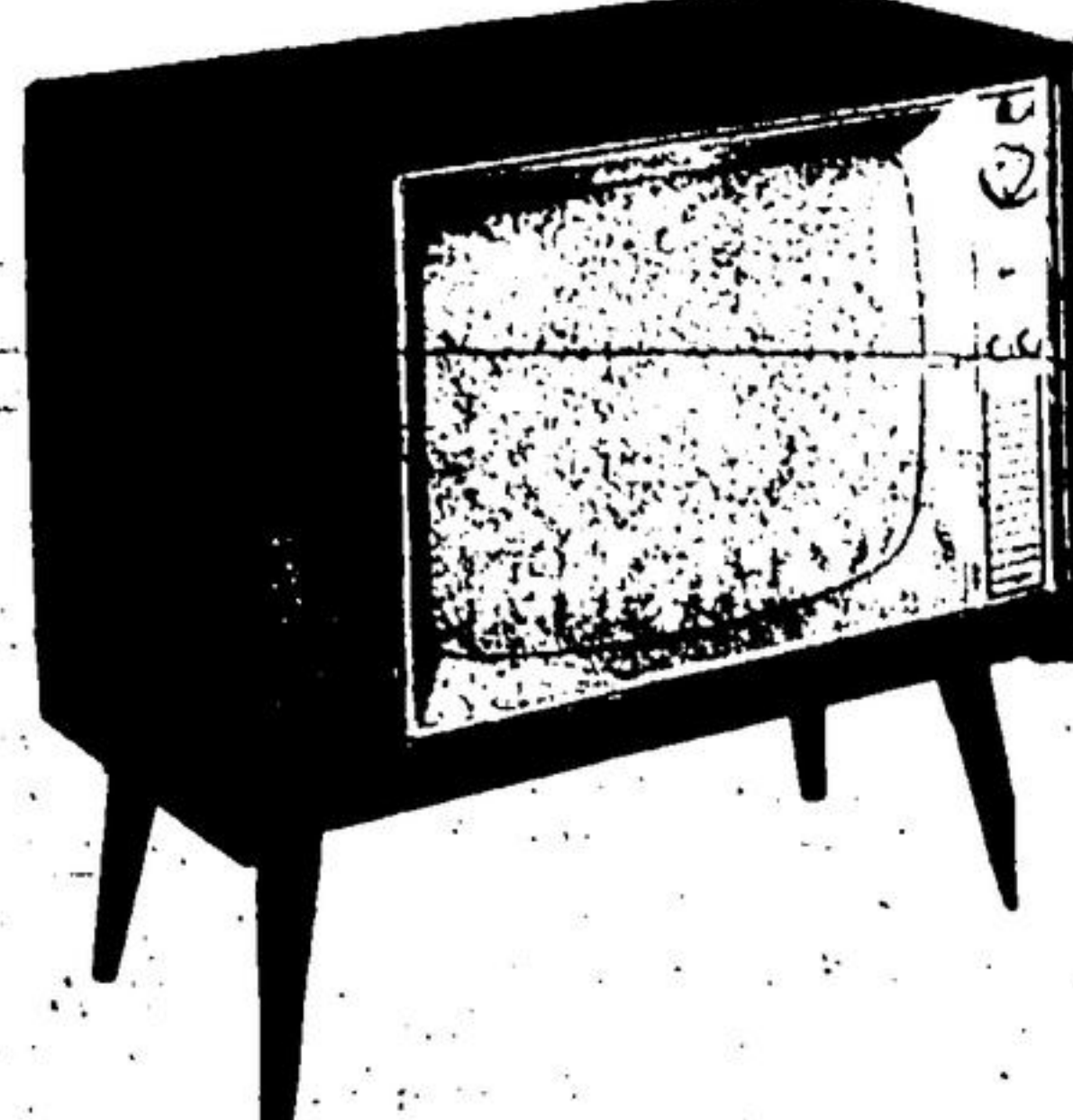
