A Georgetown's woman's niece has won the Highland Dancing Championship of the world.

Miss Sandra Wright, 18 year old niece of Mrs. Herb Brown, 59 Normandy Blvd., Georgetown, won the title in Scotland. She is a dancing teacher in Auckland, New Zealand, and has taken honours in Highland dancing competitions throughout New Zealand.

She said after seeing the standard of dancing in visiting Scottish shows she felt encouraged to go overseas to try her luck.

She appeared on television and signed a five months contract with the Callum Kennedy Show in Glasgow Metropolitan. She also gave displays at the Edinburgh Festival in August.

Miss Wright is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. Wright and credits much of her success to her dancing teacher.

# Lively Panel Discussion Principals Visit Rotary

The principals of Georgetown's five public schools were guests of the local Rotary club at their dinner meeting Sept. 14. The principals, V. Stein of Chapel Street, Hazel Allen of Kennedy, W. French of Park, W. Kinrade of Wrigglesworth and L. MacDonald of Harrison, were subjected to a barrage of un-guest like questions on education in the local public schools.

A suggestion that students should be younger when they graduate from Grade eight, brought some measure of agreement from the principals. They felt the early grades could possibly be telescoped into less time. However, they still had to consider the slow and average child. The accelerated classes fill this need to some extent.

There was some doubt that the Universities and Teacher's Colleges would accept a student under eighteen anyway, thus making earlier graduation a handicap.

General satisfaction with the quality of their teaching staffs was expressed by all the principals, and qualified satisfaction with their accommodation.

The lack lies mainly in gymnasium, auditorium and shop facilities according to the educators.

The controversial question of French being introduced in public schools remained controversial with opinion being divided. The problem of time and lack of qualified teachers were the main arguments against the innovation. To overcome the teacher lack, one of the principals felt French speaking residents given a short course in teaching methods, should be used to teach conversational French.

While no principal felt a B.A. should be required to teach public school they felt it would be an asset, and probably inevitable as the teacher shortage diminishes. However, they did feel it should be a course slanted particularly to teaching rather than a general course.

A few random comments revealed unusual bits of information — according to Mr. Kinrade, the law states a student can stay in public school

until age twenty-one. In addition up till 1936, rooms with fifty five to sixty children were common place in Georgetown. Rotarian Ian Cass was general chairman for the discussion.

# RECIPE OF THE MONTH

## BAKED FRUIT COCKTAIL DELIGHT

1 cup flour  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1 egg, beaten  
1 tsp. soda  
pinch of salt
