Labour Council Asks Members To Boycott Metro Newspapers

Delegates from Georgetown, Burlington, Clarkson, Milton and Oakville, at last week's meeting of the Oakville and District Labour Council, voted overwhelmingly to recommend to their respective Local Unions Membership to cancel all subscriptions of Metro Newspapers involved in the Toronto Printer-Publisher dispute. The delegates representing 8200 Unionists in Halton and South Peel Counties took this action after an address by Brother Ray Hling who served as a member of the nine-man negotiating Committee of the Toronto Typographical Union with the Publishers earlier this year. Brothers Ernie Lush of Milton and William Sherlock of Oakville of the same Union also attended the Council meeting.

Brother Hling in his speech stated that the Toronto Newspaper Publishers precipitated this dispute by introducing new work rules that would have been arbitrarily forced onto the union.

He further stated that the Metro Publishers are responsible for the continuation of the dispute and the aim is the destruction of the Toronto Printers Union.

He offered evidence to the union delegates in his speech by charging that on July 9, almost to the minute, simultaneously 18 men were fired because of refusal to work under the new work rules.

Mr. Hling completed his speech by saying that the union has no "honourable alternative" but to fight "union-busting employers" with the utmost vigor at the local's disposal.

He pleaded with the Council Delegates to support his local union in the fight against these publishers by serving notice that "the Globe and Mail, The Daily Star, the Weekly Star and the Telegram are no longer welcomed in the residences of organized Labour people."

Marshall Winner in Junior Ploughing Match
