Everyone likes a midway and Georgetown Fair would not be the same without one.

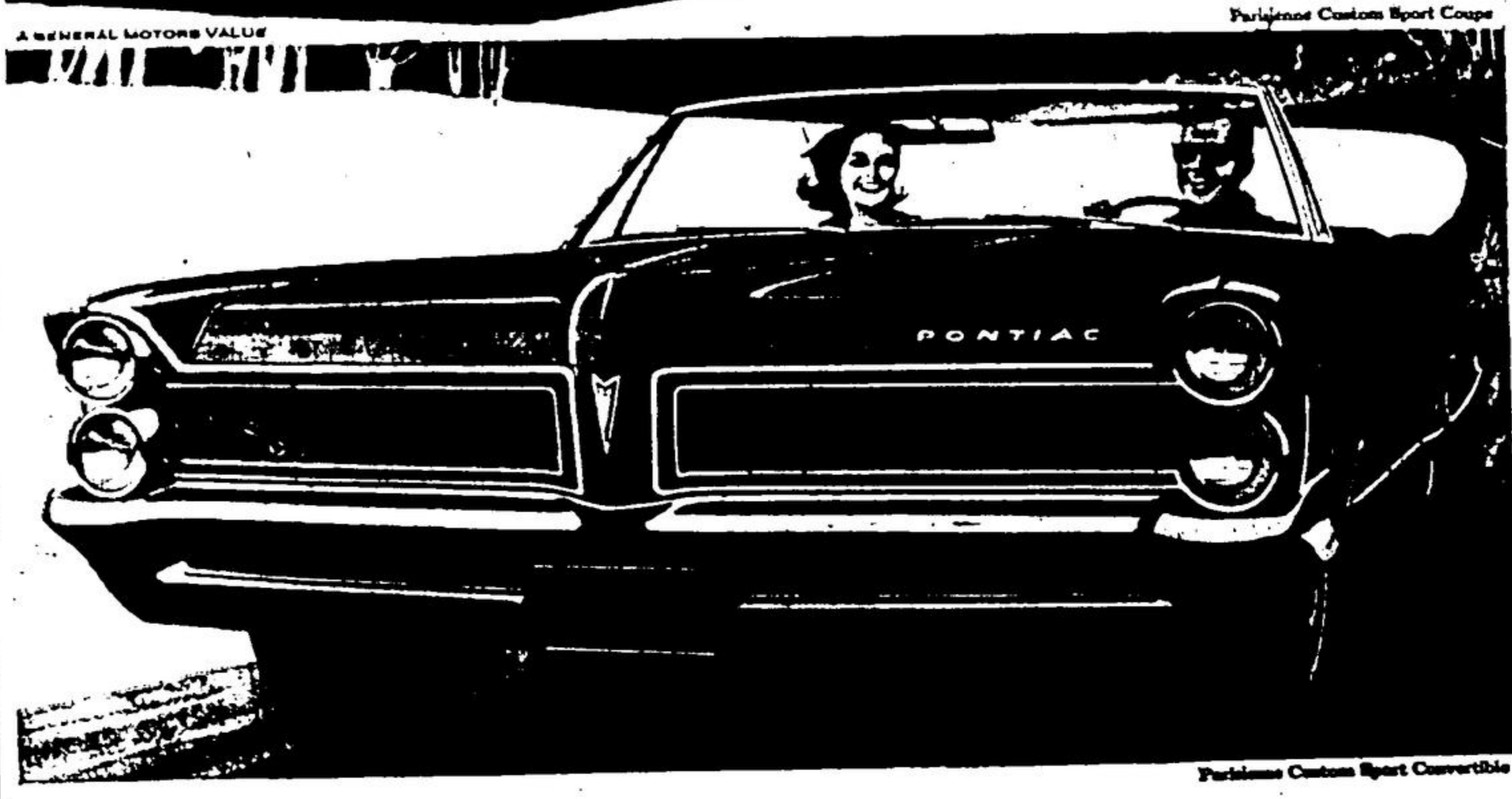
