

Ambulance Logged Over 43,000 mi.

The Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service was first organized in January, 1957 and on February 28th the ambulance which had been purchased by the town was officially given to the Association. From the first call on March 8, 1957, until August 29, 1964 a total of 1114 calls were answered, logging over 43,000 miles on the vehicles. With the opening of the Georgetown District Hospital in June 1961, the calls have not decreased, but the distance travelled has reduced, sharply. Since most calls are now of a local nature, this of course benefits the patients, the duty men and their employers (on time calls).

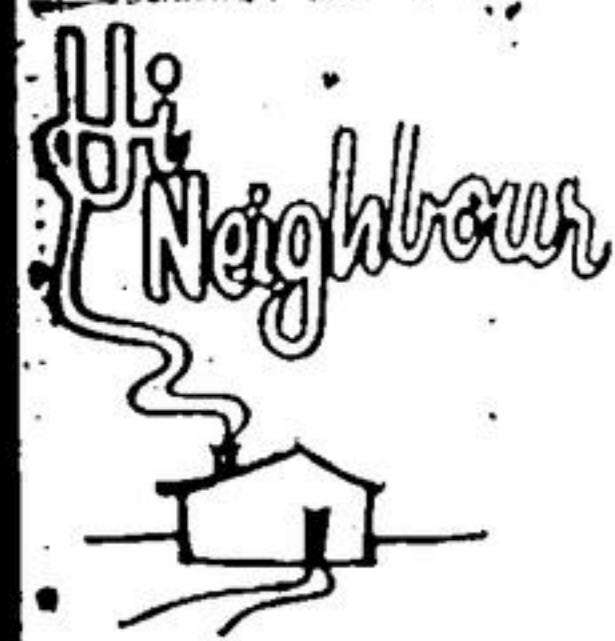
Approximately 30 members under the command of a chief, deputy chief, 2 captains, and 8 lieutenants who are responsible for arranging continuing coverage. (Resident operator at the firehall acts as dispatcher). As noted previously there are two men assigned to each twelve hour shift. From the foregoing it may be seen that the service is made possible through a group of public spirited citizens and since its inception, G.V.A.S. has endeavoured to be self supporting insofar as "personal" matters such as gifts, cards, flowers etc. to members suffering illness or bereavement are concerned, but all legitimate operational costs are paid by the Corporation.
