Varsity was heavier by 20 pounds per man, but the buzzaw Beaver attack was too much to cope with. Gerry Cunningham scored, placing the ball dead centre between the goal posts; Les Judge again added the points. Ken Adamson added a further 5 and Newman collected his second touchdown with a ball that felt more like a greasy pig. Judge added the extra points. Keith Gray gave the parting shot. A standout in the game was Vicky 25 yd line, put his head down and rained over, leaving a trail of downed opponents. Final score 31-0.
