

## Lorne Scots Best Unit In Canadian Militia

The local Lorne Scots Regiment has been judged the best militia infantry unit in Canada. The unit is the winner of the Sir Casimir Gzowski Trophy emblematic of this proficiency. There are 60 militia infantry units in Canada.

The trophy was awarded last Friday evening at the annual meeting of the Canadian Infantry Association. The trophy was formally presented to Lt. Col. E. F. Conover, C.D. Brampton, Commanding Officer of the Lornes, by Col. J. C. Allan, DSO, MBE, CD, Commandant of the Royal Canadian School of Infantry, Camp Borden.

The Lorne Scots were nominated for the competition by Maj. Gen. George Kitching, General Officer Commanding Central Command. Donated in 1896, the trophy goes each year to the nation's most proficient militia infantry unit. The award is made on the

basis of unit strength in parade and exercise, marksmanship, administration efficiency and the week-end exercises, etc.

Training officer of the Lorne Scots is Maj. J. G. Miller, Brampton, Maj. E. G. Hardie, Ingleton is second in command. Regimental Sgt. Maj. is Ken Murray, Acton.

The regiment was recently accorded another honour when it was chosen from all other units in 17 Militia Group to compete in the Central Command Leadership and Initiative training competitions. This group includes Hamilton and the Niagara Peninsula.

There will be no regulation of height and age required for Auxiliary Police volunteers.

In a report to the Halton County Council the Emergency Measures Municipal Committee said some discussion has been spent on the matter and it had been agreed that the question of height and age of applicants should be left to the discretion of the Chief Constable of each municipality.

It was reported that eight applications had been completed in Oakville and another six were expected to be filed shortly. Georgetown has forwarded seven applicants to Oakville for approval.
