Election Question Pay The Pipers?

The third reading of the by-law to ask the property owners approval of a \$500 yearly grant to the Georgetown Girls' Pipe Band passed Monday night at Council meeting, but now without Reeve J. Elliot voicing his disapproval.

"We have been giving them \$250, and I don't feel we should tie ourselves to a definite amount," he argued, "they should get what we can afford". He feels a vote is unnecessary.

The mayor replied that he felt in the past councils have been granting without authorization. "We should find out the ratepayers wish, it's the only legal way to do it", he concluded.

In reply, Reeve Elliot pointed out that the solicitor said it was within the town's rights, and no protest had come from the Municipal Board.

The by-law passed with Reeve Elliot and Coun. Hildebrandt opposed.

Hundred Teens Pitch in For Local Sightless

Georgetown and district's blind will benefit when over a hundred local high school students go calling door to door next week in a fund raising blitz. The students are aiming to collect \$1,000. Their blitz is sponsored by the Georgetown Lions.

"Last year it cost \$1,100 to provide these services for the 12 blind people in the area served by Georgetown," Blind Welfare Committee Chairman Lyn McLaren said yesterday. "The canvass by local teens is an annual affair, but last year was held in the spring. The students will give receipts to those who care to contribute."

The blitz will start Monday. "Letters have been sent to local industry and we are relying on a good response here to help boost the campaign over the top," McLaren said.

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Clarkson on Monday of this week were Mrs. Don Smith, Mrs. A. Law, Mrs. C. McEneaney and Mrs. J. Black.

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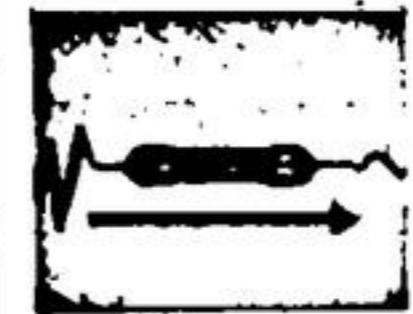
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
