

Abitibi Research Centre Planned For Clarkson

Abitibi Pulp & Paper Company, Limited announces plans to expand its research facilities. A new modern laboratory and pilot plant will be built on an 8-acre site in the Sheridan Park Research Community located in the western suburbs of Toronto. Sheridan Park is an exclusive research complex made up of the Ontario Research Foundation and research centres of several leading industrial companies.

In his announcement, Paul E. Roberts, the company President said: "Unquestionably our Research Division is a major factor in our company's progress, a fact that becomes more evident each year. Abitibi's leadership in the pulp and paper industry dates back to the pioneering research activities at Iroquois Falls in the early 1920's followed by enlarged laboratories and pilot plants at Sault Ste. Marie in 1947. During the past 16 years many new products and processes have been developed and we now have over 100 patents either granted or pending.

"The rapidly growing need for larger and more functional facilities for our research operations required that we look for a site that would fill this demand as well as provide for future expansions. Abitibi will be the first pulp and paper company to take advantage of

this concept of a research community.

"This new location", Mr. Roberts continued, "will enable our research team to expand the services they render to our customers and to our 18 plants located in Canada and the United States. Proximity to the industry's market places in Canada and the United States will give the scientists a better feel of the needs of our newspaper customers, the graphic arts industry and the building trades.

"Finally, there is the measurable benefit to be gained from close and personal association with the other scientists and technicians in allied industry who will be located in the Sheridan Park development. The interchange of ideas, consultation and proximity to the Ontario Research Foundation will be very beneficial. It is interesting to note that seven of our Canadian universities are within easy driving distance of our new site. The staff of Abitibi's Central Research Division consists of scientists in chemistry, physics, electronics, chemical and mechanical engineering, many with post-graduate and doctorate degrees. A scientific campus like Sheridan Park is most appealing and offers personal advantages to our people. The expanded facilities will enable additional projects to be undertaken, provide increased responsibilities for our present group as well as opportunities for additional scientists and supporting staff."

Sheridan Park Research Community is located in the midst of some of the most up-to-date suburban communities in Canada — only a few minutes west of Metropolitan Toronto and with world-wide communication through nearby Toronto International Airport. Construction of the new Abitibi Central Research building will commence in early 1965 with a completion date scheduled for

the Spring of 1966. The building will be designed by John B. Parkin Associates, Architects and Engineers.

On Saturday morning members of the 4-H Tractor Maintenance Club drove a tractor and wagon through a slalom course, backing it up to a designated spot. The winning

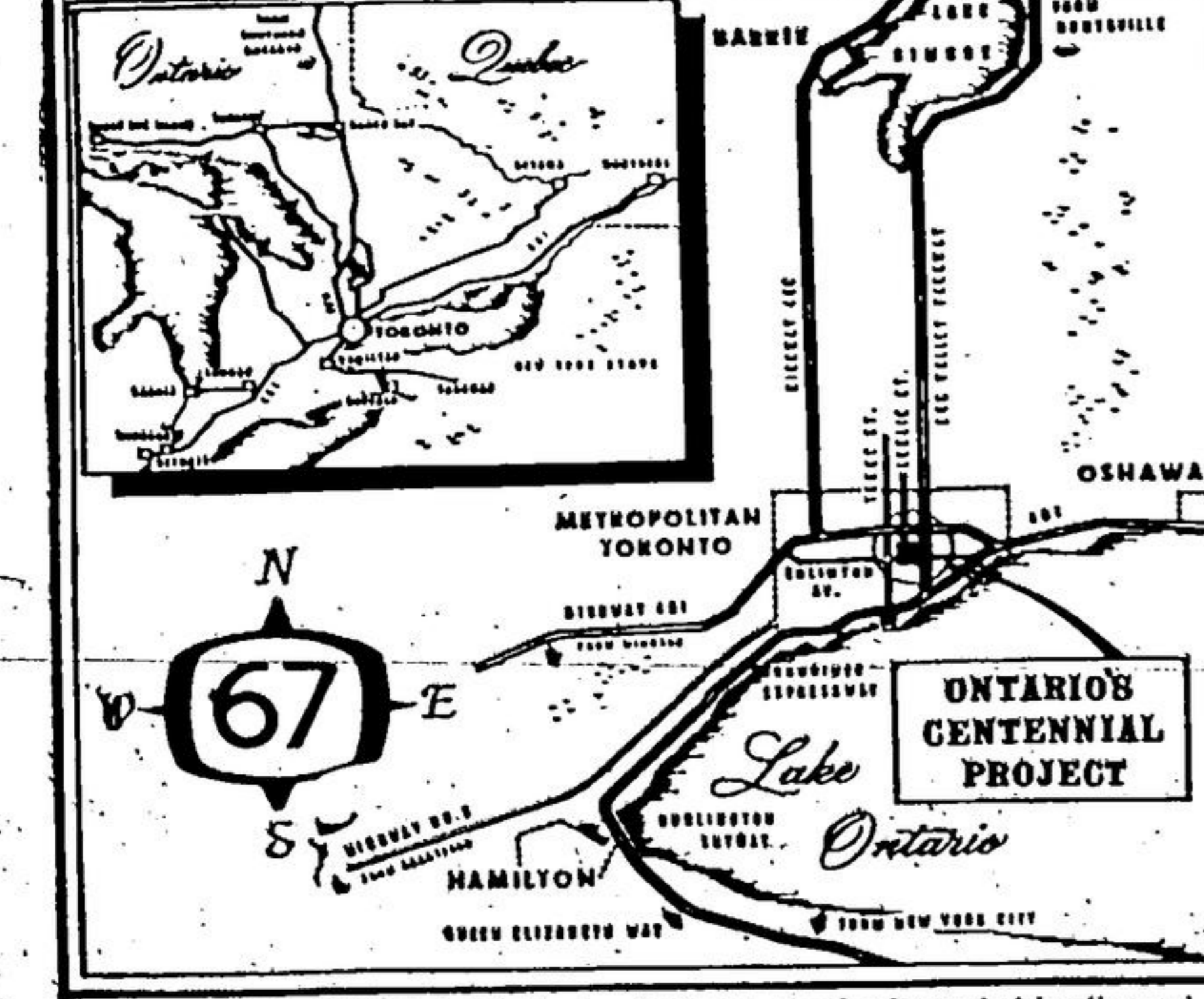
Suffolk Reminiscences When Old Friends Meet
