# Land Of The Future Says Minister-To-Be

This past summer I had the greatest experience of my young life. As part of my training for the United Church ministry I was settled as the Rev. G. M. Hutchinson in Telfordville, Alberta, for the summer months. Ever since I arrived in Alberta I have wondered why I was so lucky as to draw this assignment. Back at Emmanuel College in Toronto now, I want to share in retrospect some of my summer experiences with you.

The area of Alberta to which I was assigned is about twenty-five miles west of Leduc. It is rich in historic background and scenic beauty. The land just starts to roll into the foothills of the mighty Rockies. It is a land of farming, oil wells and small businesses. Some of the land is just being cleared for the first time and some people are still homesteading.

The people are just beginning to enjoy their new prosperity gained with the aid of chemical fertilizers and the work produced by the oil developments. Equipping all the farms has progressed well and the situation of the man is now being turned to replacing their original homes with more modern homes and conveniences. There are no "oil barons" since the all rights are owned by the provincial government.

Our charge or Parish contained an amazing variety of church life. In Thornby, the largest village and economic hub of the area, the church was really an urban church with most of the members living right within the village. In Warburg and Breton it was a mixture of rural and urban people. In Telfordville the church was in the small community but drew most of its members from the surrounding farms. In Genesee we had our services in the school and the people came from all around to attend it. The little run down church at Weywood was really out in the middle of nowhere and people came from all directions to attend it.

My main work, besides assisting the minister with the services every Sunday, was pastoral visitation and Vacation Schools. In visitation I met some amazing people and heard some amazing stories of local history which added a great deal of colour to my black and
