Church Ladies Give \$600. For New Rectory Furnace

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

When playing in a no trumps contract, it is often important to control which opponent should get the lead. Whether you can do this will depend on the cards held. Here is an interesting hand illustrating this point. It occurred last Monday at the Action Bridge Club.
BOARD NO. 10
Dealer - North.
Both sides vulnerable.
North
S-A K 10 8

You may not agree with South's first response of 1NT. Often there is a problem of whether to show suit or the number of points held. I feel that with a balanced hand (NT-type hand), always show points if possible. Over one club, a 1NT response shows 6-11 points and this describes South's hand. How South plays the hand depends entirely on how West defends. South can take four clubs, three diamonds and two spades for nine tricks - as long as the opponents don't take five tricks. If West starts with the heart ace, heart king, then heart jack, South must play to keep West off the lead. A low club is led and if West plays low, the six is played from dummy. This keeps West off the lead and as long as South takes the king and queen of dia-
