

Twenty-five Men, Equipment Set To Go On Siren's Wail

Twenty-five Georgetown men are looking to Georgetown residents for a break this week and in fact every week of the year. They're the men who form the Georgetown Volunteer Fire Department and they're looking for the break this week in particular because October 6 to 10 is Fire Prevention Week. And if ever the town's streets should hold their tongues this is the week.

The prevention measures were mostly on the part of town county insurance inspectors and members of the brigade yesterday as they took part in a blitz that ferreted out potential fire hazards in the town's commercial buildings and industrial plants.

The fire department members are hoping the householders will follow their lead and take a look in their own places of residence for the electrical outlets, over-burn fuses, worn

insulation on wiring, stacks of old newspapers and rags, and matches within reach of children are some of the wrongs to look for.

"It takes a lot of work for the brigade members to hold down a regular job and still devote time to being a volunteer fire fighter," Chief Erwin Lewis told The Herald. "As well as the actual fighting of fires, the men have to attend practices twice a month, and

Two Injured in Truck Flip, Highway Corner

Two Georgetown men were hurt when the truck they were riding in flipped on its side at the intersection of Mountainview Rd. and Guelph St. where construction work has ripped up the pavement. The accident happened at 12:40 a.m. Friday.

Police said Bertrand Henderson, 23, of 28 Normandy Blvd. suffered a broken arm, and David Paul Fendley, 26, of Glen Williams suffered head cuts

and bruises. Henderson was a passenger in the truck driven by Fendley.

Cat. Harry Liberty placed the damaged at \$450. The truck was eastbound on Guelph St. when it hit the dirt surface road and slid sideways in the mud before turning on its side.

A car driven by Henry Sawyer, 41 Edith St., received \$350 damage when it hit a hydro pole at the King St. Mountainview corner Sunday.

Sawyer was southbound on Mountainview. He started to

make a right turn onto King and discovering he'd made a mistake tried to wheel the car back onto Mountainview. It skidded out of control and rammed the pole.

Firemen had to stand by Monday night with a hose trained on spilled gasoline when a tow truck peeled a 1954 Ford car off Steen's Dairy front steps after an accident there.

The car's gas tank was tipped open when it plunged over the sidewalk at the corner of

Water and Beck streets. The blaze that might easily have been touched off by a spark during the moving operation never came. Firemen washed most of the spilled gas down a storm sewer.

The car driven by William McCandless, 22 Wesleyan St. was a total wreck. It clipped off a stop sign, street sign and wrought iron rail before being halted by the concrete steps.

firefighting equipment must be serviced in preparation for the next alarm, and then after each run.

"Trucks must be ready to roll at a moment's notice," he said. "The drivers have the responsibility for the condition of each vehicle, but if there is any operating problem over and above the regular maintenance, myself or some of the other men with knowledge mechanics will handle it. Of course very difficult repairs are handled by a garage."

Once the trucks have returned to the hall the men have to remove wet hoses and replace with dry, check and clean all pieces of equipment that have to be attended to to keep the town's fire protection one of the best in the province.

But as well as equipment, the ability of the firefighters themselves has to be up to standard. This summer six attended a basic school at Milton, others a regional school at Oakville. And Chief Lewis

stayed on top of the latest methods by attending a three-day course for Chiefs at Toronto. Arrangements are being made now to send Georgetown department men to a firefighting college planned in Gravenhurst next spring.

"Firefighting is getting to be a science," Chief Lewis said. "Now we have to make decisions faster to save as much time and work as well as expense to the fire victims. If there is a course available on any of the many aspects of fire
