**Sixth Public School En Route, But Not For Year**

The pressure of swelling enrollment is edging the public school board towards the construction brink again — but they won't be turning any sod this year. Mr. Mooney, chairman of the board's planning committee, told his fellow trustees Wednesday that projected enrollment figures indicate next term's increase won't warrant launching a construction program. However, a sixth school will be a must by September, 1966. Mr. Mooney said he discussed the enrollment problem with the Dept. of Education inspector. They decided the enrollment in two years would constitute four more rooms. To take these plus classes now in portable classrooms on the Harrison school grounds, a 7 room building will be the solution. Mr. Mooney's forecast showed the present total enrollment spread over five schools is 2,223. Next term's total will be 2,328; 1965's will be 2,429. The forecast goes as far as 1968 when an enrollment of 2,532 is forecast. The figures are arrived at assuming no major house construction.

**New Development Important To County Raspberry Growers**

Increased yields and longer-lived plantings should result from a new development in the raspberry industry — a New Ontario Raspberry Plant Certification Program. This program is considered a major step forward for the raspberry industry. In the past, plantings have been severely infected with viruses. Viruses have been responsible, to a large extent, for causing reduced yields and shortening the life of plantings because infected plants never recover but exist in a less vigorous condition and serve as a source of infection of healthy plants. Unfortunately, infected plants do not always show symptoms but nevertheless their vigor is reduced. As a result of recent advances in methods of virus detection and ways of obtaining virus-free plants from infected ones, virus-free plantings of the raspberry varieties commercially important in Ontario now exist. To make these plants available to fruit growers, a new Ontario Raspberry Plant Certification Program was started in 1962. Certified plants from this program will be available in the fall of 1965 and their cost should be in line with present costs.

**Small Buffalo Herd Will Roam Halton County Range**

Buffalo are coming to Halton County. When next spring rolls around visitors to Rattlesnake Point Park, will be able to view several of the huge animals in a picturesque natural setting. The Halton Conservation Authority is arranging to obtain about five buffalo for the 60 acres of grassland on the park flats below the escarpment. While the primary purpose for this move is to reduce the cost of keeping the grass short, it is felt that the buffalo will attract tourists to the area. David Murray, conservation officer said he knew of no place in Ontario with the exception of Sudbury where buffalo are kept in natural surroundings. "We have had an offer of two buffalo from the Calgary Zoo, and one from Riverdale Zoo in Toronto," said Murray. "We have had a letter from the federal government saying we could have two buffalo or more. These will probably come from Elk Island Park in Alberta. We understand that buffalo are very easy to take care of and very docile. They shouldn't be any problem."

**Employment Statistics Show Increased Activity**

The increased employment activity in the area noted during the month of August continued unabated throughout September. During September 1964 a total of 546 persons were placed in employment by the National Employment Service, an increase of 91 placements over last month when jobs were found for 455 persons.

The manufacturing industries of the area provided jobs for almost two thirds of the individuals who were placed in employment, with the office recording 353 placements in this category. Jobs in construction were found for 88 persons, wholesale and retail trade accounted for 33 men and women, and 53 jobs were filled in service trades and domestic employment.

There were 800 persons registered for work at the end of September 1964, down 111 from the same month last year when there were 911 persons registered.

**Peach Jelly Roll**
