**Establish Procedure
For Marketing Corn**

Market practice has been established for corn going through country elevators. Corn at 15.5% moisture sets the standard. Lower moisture does not bring any premium. Higher moisture discounts to the seller. These discounts cover the shrinkage accounted for by drying to 15.5% moisture, cost of drying, and a portion attributed to "invisible shrinkage". Elevator and handling charges are extra.

If corn with 15.5% kernel moisture is selling for \$1.30 per bushel, this is the equivalent of approximately 56¢ per bushel for corn at 30% kernel moisture. Farmer to farmer sales increase every year, especially if wet corn where suitable storage is available. This kind of corn can be a poor buy at any price unless it is fully matured at harvest. Every 100 pounds of matured ear corn commonly produces about 62 lbs. of shelled corn. The amount of kernel in immature corn is much less. 62 lbs of ear corn are required to yield 56 lbs. or one bushel of shelled corn at 15% kernel moisture. However, if the kernel moisture of the corn you are buying or selling is 30% kernel moisture, you require 80.2 lbs. of ear corn to provide the equivalent amount. Corn shrinks when dried. To compare the value of wet corn with that of dry corn, you must know the percentage kernel moisture and take this "shrinkage" into consideration.
