

Woman Doctor Celebrates 100th Birthday at Manor

A unique event that has never occurred before in the twelve-year history of Halton Manor was observed on Thanksgiving Sunday afternoon, October 11th, when Dr. Annie Higbee, who is one of the women residents of the Manor and a graduate medical doctor celebrated her one hundredth birthday.

Dr. Higbee and her family, assisted by Mr. Stan Allen, the Superintendent of the Manor, Mrs. Allen and the Women's Auxiliary of the Manor, held open house in the auditorium between the hours of two and four o'clock. Many outside guests and residents of the Manor called upon her to offer their admiring sincere felicitations.

Many bouquets had been used to decorate the auditorium. Two of these bouquets were floral arrangements from the Ontario Federation of Women Doctors and from the Committee of Management of Halton Manor. A number of individual bouquets had been sent by personal friends.

Dr. Higbee's immediate family was present for the festivities. These members of her family were: her son, Mr. John C. Higbee and Mrs. Higbee; her grandsons-in-law and her grand-daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Salomon, and her great grand-children Catherine aged two years and Christine aged two months, all of Burlington.

Mrs. S. Allen, the Superintendent, opened the ceremony by congratulating Dr. Higbee on her excellent health and her achievement in having reached her 100th birthday. He then called on Dr. Carl Martin, Reeve of Milton and Chairman of the Committee of Management, who extended congratulations on his own behalf and on the behalf of the Committee, and wished Dr. Higbee many happy returns of the day. Dr. Martin was followed by Mr. George Kerr, M.P.P. for Halton and Mr. Gordon Gallagher, Reeve of Burlington and Warden of Halton County. Mr. Kerr expressed his own personal good wishes and those of Mr. John Roberts, Premier of Ontario and his government. Mr. Gallagher expressed his personal congratulations and those of the County of Halton.

Mr. Allen read some very gratifying messages that had been sent to Dr. Higbee. The most outstanding of these was a telegram from Queen Elizabeth II who was then in Quebec City. Another telegram came from Premier Roberts. A letter came from Dr. Harry Harley, M.P. for Halton, who was also present to extend greetings personally. Birthday cards were received, among others, from the Committee of Management and from the Halton Manor Women's Auxiliary.

Mountie - Speaker Impressed With Youth Forum Attention

"Canadian High Schools are not dens of vice, nor are they overrun with drug users and narcotics." This statement came Sunday from a man who should know: Sgt. G. L. Tomalty of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, in charge of the Drug and Narcotic Squad in greater Toronto.

Speaking to more than one hundred young people at a Youth Forum in the Legion Hall Sgt. Tomalty presented a brief history of the RCMP and its special work as federal agents in this province. He answered a variety of questions and convinced his audience that those who resort to narcotics or drugs do so because of mental weakness and lack of moral character. "More addiction than not," he said, "addiction is the result of criminal activities."

The RCMP has done much to reduce the incident of addic-

tion in Canada, and continues to be alert to every new trick and device of those who try to smuggle forbidden narcotics into our country.

In conversation with Legion President Ralph Hawest, after the meeting, Sgt. Tomalty said, "I was most agreeably surprised to see so many young people present; and I was very pleased at the attention they gave me and the type of questions that they asked."

The next meeting of the Forum will be in the Legion Hall on Sunday, November 1st, beginning at 7:30 p.m. A member of the Ontario Provincial Police will speak from the law's point of view, while the Halton County Health Unit will point out the health hazards and disease under the general heading of "Sex and the Teenager."

For part of this forum girls and boys will meet in separate groups.

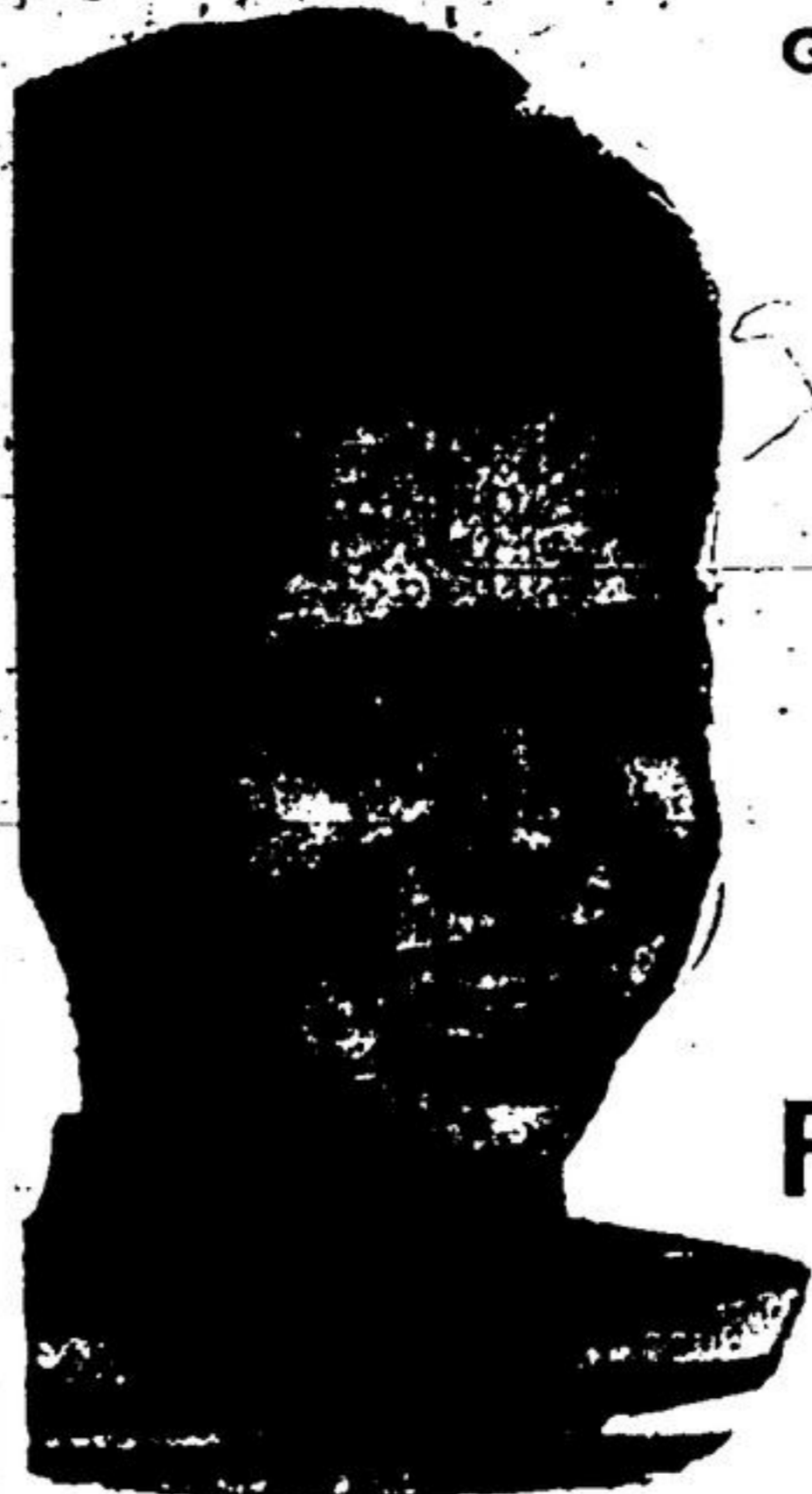
