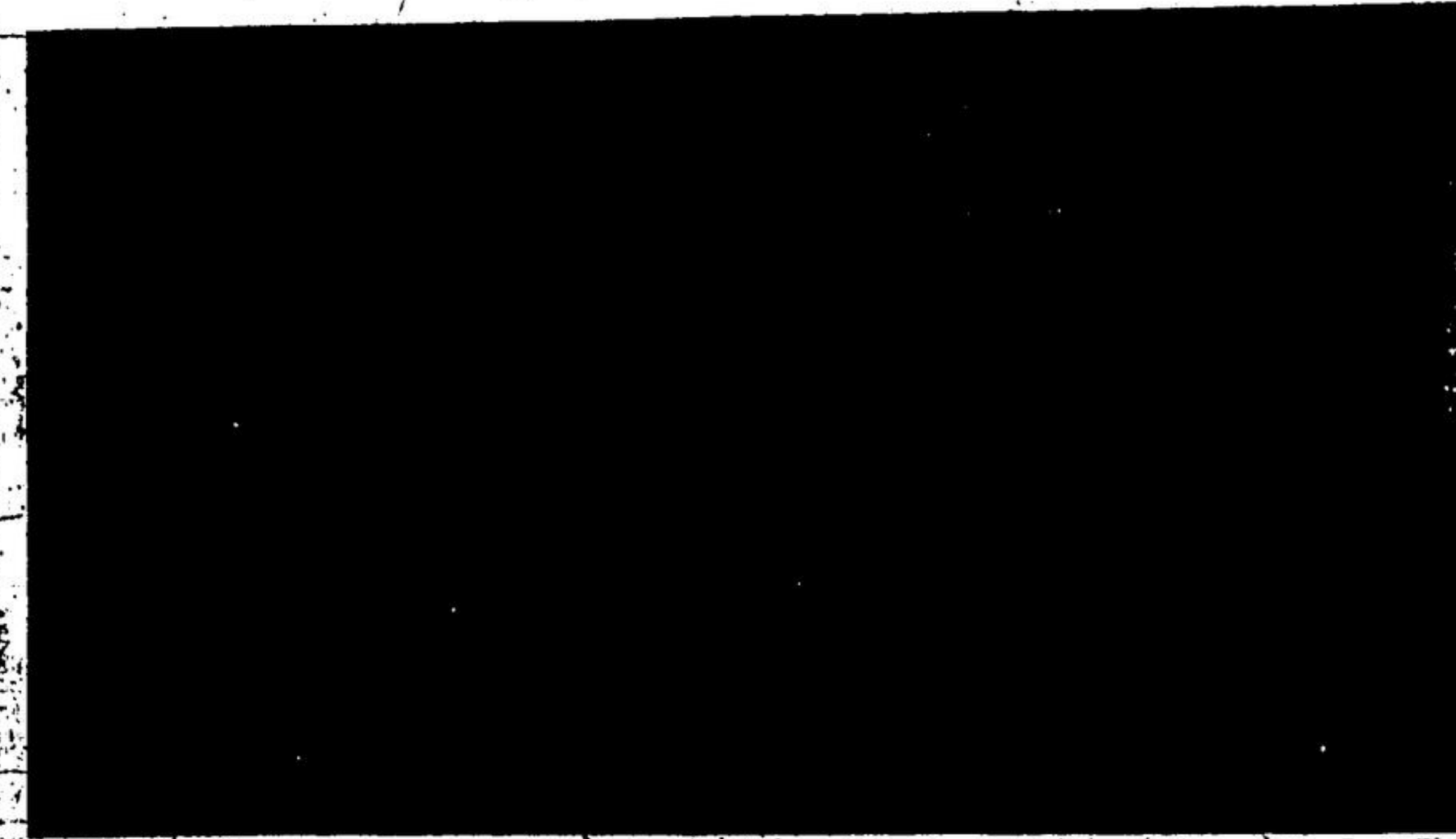

Rebels Have Royal Treat Hammer John F. Ross 41-18

The Rebels, Georgetown high school's senior football team, put together one of their best efforts in recent autumn's Friday afternoon to steamroll over John F. Ross Royals of Guelph 41-18 — a kind of scalp party to celebrate Indian summer.

It was their second win in three starts.

1st Quarter
Rebel halfback Jan Popell opened the 1st quarter scoring on a drive play for a touchdown that was converted by Cowbrough. Late in the same quarter a slat play found daylight and Popell taking good advantage of his blocking in the secondary, ran 65 yards for the major score. Cowbrough's second convert attempt was also good making the

score at the quarter 14-0.

2nd Quarter
Rebels showed good ball control in executing a march from their own 50 yard line early in the quarter that climaxed in Hespeler cracking into the endzone. The convert was missed and the half time score was Rebels 20 - Royals 0.

3rd Quarter
Playing inspired football, Guelph made their bid to erase the lead in this period. An intercepted Rebel pass was returned to the Georgetown 45, and Royal quarterback Kentner directed a march from there that finished with a touchdown by Spurrill. Moments later Jeans caught a Kentner pass in the end zone. Both scores went unconverted. Rebels added a single point in the quarter when Popell caught the Guelph plet in his own end for a safety touch. Rebs 21 - Royals 6.

4th Quarter
Georgetown fullback Rob Wigglesworth hammered for short yardage to score a Rebel touchdown early in the period which was converted by Cowbrough. Quarterback Laddie Haines engineered another Rebel sustained drive after an exchange of punts and capped it with a keeper play from the Guelph 3 yard line. Cowbrough converted.

Wigglesworth in a defensive roll killed a Guelph march and turned it into another 6 points when he picked off a Kentner pass at centre field and went the distance. The convert was missed. The Royals struck back with time running out again via the aerial route. Kentner tossed to Fox for their final touchdown.
