Smallest School, But Park Athletes Tops at Field Day

Georgetown's smallest public school, Park, has won the annual inter-school Track and Field Championship. Park outdistanced its closest pursuer, Harrison, by a fantastic spread of 17 points. The day was held Thursday in the park after one postponement. The winning school amassed 72 points on the day to Harrison's 56. Chapel St. came with a hair's breadth of making it a two-way tie for the runner-up spot. Chapel, which led in the early going, collected 52 points; Wrigglesworth was 4th with 38 and Kennedy trailed with 27. The points calculations are weighted to give the smaller schools an equal chance, but Park's total before the weighting was still tops. Three young athletes tied in the individual points competition, Marilyn Emerson of Harrison, Bruno Podlinske of Chapel St., and Lyle Winfield of Park. Here are the winners-by events:

As in a regular army presentation of the colours, the flags will be mounted on poles draped with gold braid. The presentation will be made by High School board chairman Ed Hall and a senior officer of the Lower Scots. While the Board donated some of the cost, the cadets raised the larger slice of the \$175 cost of the flags by dances and bazaars. The corps flag consists of the High School crest with cadet corps 676 across it, and a small Union Jack in the corner. The flags will accompany the Corps on all ceremonial functions such as the Remembrance Day services at the Memorial Park and the School. The flags will be on display in the High School trophy case when not in use.

Varsity Blues Tough But Bow 8-0 to the Beavers

The rugged Beavers travelled to Toronto last Sunday and came face to face with their toughest opposition this year. The University of Toronto squad was undoubtedly the fastest, fittest team the local boys have played this season, but they still managed to handle them 8 to 0. The first score of the game came almost immediately when the Beavers got the ball from a lineup at just about mid-field. Gord Lee sent Newman away with a long pass, and after missing a tackle from the Varsity wing forward, he lifted a high kick deep into the blues' defence. This move caught the defence by surprise and the whole Beaver backfield was down on top of them before they recovered. Newman recovered his own kick and sped away from the Varsity fullback to register the 3 points. Trevor Sampson converted and the local squad led 5-0 after only 2 minutes of play. Beavers made their own break for the next score. Lee again ball went from Newman to start the backs moving. The ball went from Newman to Heffron, who drew the two remaining defenders and then fired a pass to winger Les Judge. He was wide open and went 25 yds for a touchdown in the corner. The convert at 15 yds was carried wide by the wind and Beavers led 8-0. Until half time Beavers kept pounding away at the blues' defense but could not get over for another score because of the crash tackling and first class covering up of the Varsity wing three quarters. After the half, the blues started to carry the game to the Beavers. Their exceptionally fine scrum continually pushed the Beavers right off the ball and only the great efforts of Pete Corris at Hooker

ensured Beavers of more than a fair share of the ball. Standing in a strong defensive stand later in the game were Beecham, Clark and Captain Sampson. The pressure was finally relieved by Sandy Mackenzie with a long kick into touch from deep in his own end zone. This magnificent stand, perked the locals up a gain and they carried play right down into the Varsity zone. Neither side managed to score again although Beavers came close on a penalty kick. This was a satisfying victory for the club who have now gone 6 games without defeat this season. Next Sunday Beavers meet last year's Ontario Champions, The Irish Canadians of Toronto at Georgetown Park at 3 p.m. This is an exhibition game, a gainst one of the finest clubs in Canada.
