

Expect Tender Call This Week For Manor Addition

Tenders are expected to be called this week on a \$1,000,000 home for the aged for Halton County.

The Halton Centennial Manor board of management is meeting with architect Donald E. Skinner today, to issue the call for tenders on a three-story, 150-bed building to be erected adjacent to the present Manor.

Several changes in the earlier working drawings, and an increase in steel prices that forced a change in some material lists, have delayed the tender call for several weeks. Earlier, the board had hoped to begin construction in the spring of this year. After steel prices went up, the architect changed the plans to use masonry supporting walls and effect a considerable saving on costs.

Tenders close November 15 and the board expects to meet and review the bids on that day. It is expected the construction will take a year to 18 months.

Right now the present 220-bed Manor is filled and there is a waiting list of applicants. There are a few empty beds in the special care wing, but the rest of the building is filled up, Superintendent S. A. Allen reported.

Members of the Manor board include Warden Gordon Colclough of Burlington, Reeve C. A. Martin of Milton, Reeve H. E. Hinton of Acton, Reeve J. Elliott of Georgetown and Deputy Reeve Lester Whiting of Oakville. Lloyd Gohn is secretary and Mr. Allen attends all

board meetings.

The new Manor would be partially financed by a \$200,000 loan from the Federal-Provincial Works Assistance program. It will be designed for a later addition of 150 more beds. Cost is \$8000 to \$9000 per bed.

The three-story building would accommodate 50 beds on each floor, with elevators running to all floors. Office, library-board room, tea room, tuck shop and two sitting rooms will be located in the front of the lower floor.

An underground passageway will connect the new home to the existing Manor. Laundry, chapel and auditorium facilities presently available will serve both homes.
