

# Auxiliary Would Establish Sunshine Graduate Workshop

The urgent need for commencing the ground work for a Sheltered Workshop for these girls and boys that are beyond law to leave the Sunshine School for Retarded Children at the age of 18 was discussed at the October meeting of the Georgetown Auxiliary for Retarded Children Tuesday Oct. 27.

The president, Mrs. Florence English, chaired the meeting which was held at the home of Mrs. T. Runham, 12 Parkview Blvd.

During the discussion an article from a national magazine which had been brought to the attention of the auxiliary by Mrs. Evelyn Peddle was read. It consisted of a report on the contribution to ward helping these young retarded adults in London, Ontario, by the Northern Electric Company there, in sub-contract work let out to the London "Opportunity Workshop".

It pointed up two extremely interesting facts - that rejects were non-existent - and that the pride taken in the work done so well was reflected in the quality.

An article from the Ontario Association for Retarded Children Newsletter was also read, which is of vital concern to not only the Auxiliary and the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded, but to every member of the community.

Excerpts from this article are as follows:

"Another chapter in the history of community programmes for the mentally retarded is bearing completion. The day schools for the trainable retarded have begun their final term as institutions of learning dependent upon charity.

"Commencing on January 1, 1965, the operating costs for Ontario's 87 schools for retarded children will be fully met from revenues. The new legislation, as passed by the Ontario government will place the financial responsibility of conducting such programmes in the hands of the provincial and municipal governments. This major step forward heralds the beginning of a new era on behalf of the mentally retarded. (Note: The local Associations are still responsible for the upkeep of the building and any repairs thereto.)

"For 17 years local Associations have begun the task of initiating or expanding their adult programmes, pre-school services, home care, religious education, local and regional camp programmes as well as volunteer services to the hospitals and hospital schools.

"As we conclude one chapter in our history, it would be wise to keep in mind that achievements are like trousers - they become bare if you rest on them."

# LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

A sub-title to this week's column might be 'How to make 10 tricks with four losers in the hand. No - the answer is not to cheat or have the opponent make a mistake.

The answer lies in the word 'hope'. Hope that the opponent's cards are so distributed that it can be done. The hand occurred in a rubber bridge match with only pride involved.

Dealer: South  
Neither side vulnerable.

North  
S-J 8 4 2  
H-K 10 9  
D-8 8  
C-A 6 5

West  
S-K 7  
H-J 8 6 3  
D-Q J 10 6 2  
C-K 3

South  
S-A 9 8 3  
H-Q 4 2  
D-A K  
C-8 7 4 2

The bidding:  
South West North East  
1 NT Pass 2 C Pass  
2 S Pass 4 S All Pass

Although the bidding may seem strange to you, the final contract is not unreasonable. The 1 NT by South is a weak no trump - 12 to 14 points. North's two clubs is the Stayman Convention which asks opener to bid a four card major if he has one. South bids his four card spade suit and North carries the bidding to four spades.

West opens the diamond queen and declarer takes stock. Things do not look too good. A heart loser, maybe two, two club losers and possibly a trump loser as well.

Declarer tries hearts first. A low heart towards dummy, finessing the 10. East wins with the ace and exists with a diamond. Now another heart to dummy and a spade finesse. This fails and East can exit with either a trump or a heart.

Now all declarer need do is take out trump, take in last hearts and lead a club toward dummy. When West plays low, go up with the ace and lead a club back. West will win with the king and must lead a red card. You discard a club loser in dummy and ruff in your hand. Thus, one sure club loser disappears.

I hope that you have figured out the correct defensive play. West must play the king when you lead clubs. Now how many bridge players do you know who

would part with a king in this position? If West happened to have the king - queen of clubs doubleton, then no play could save them.

When a contract appears hopeless, then assume that the opponent's cards are favourably placed.

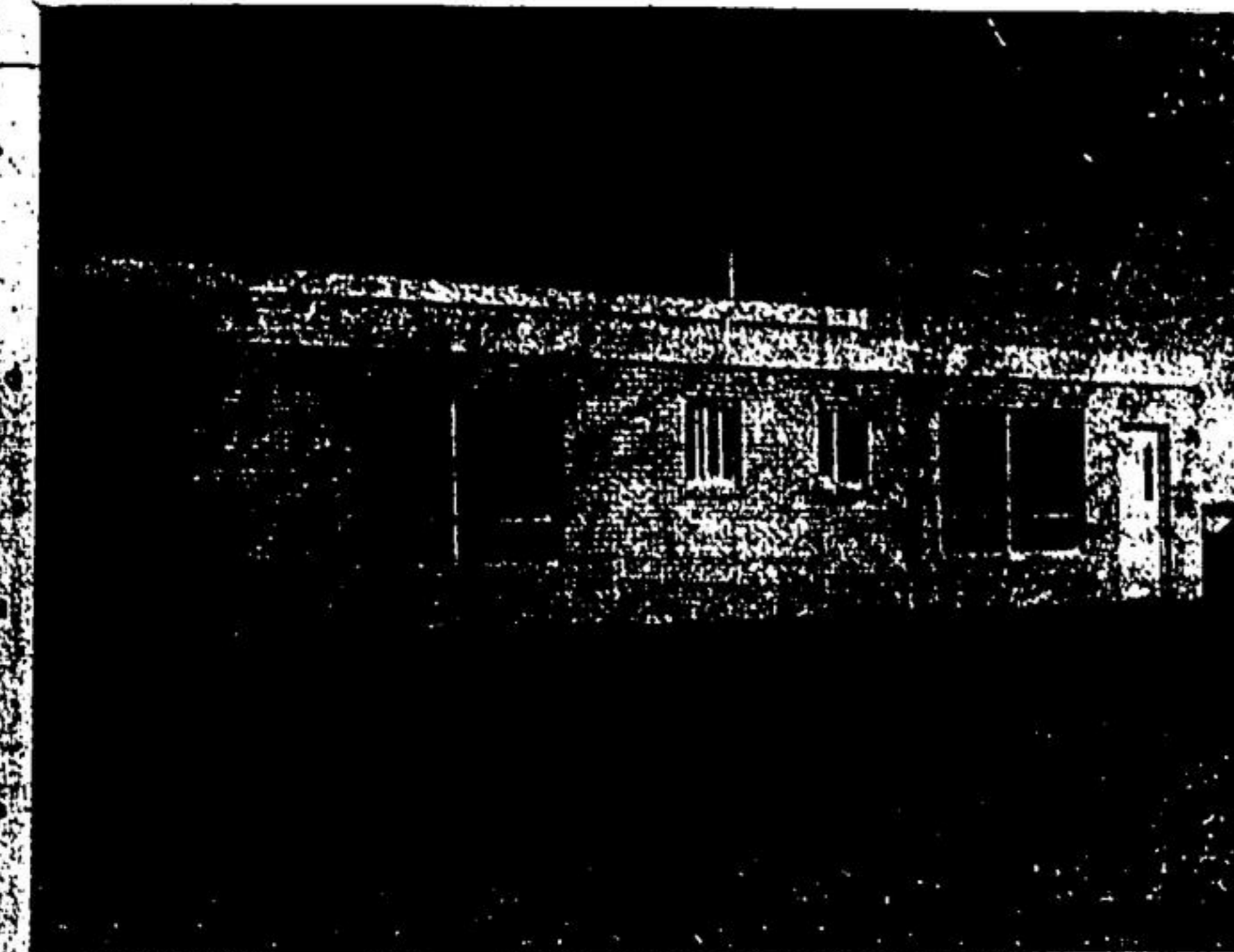
## Focus on Construction
